## A. SITUATION ANALYSIS

### Description of the disaster

At 20:00 on 20 January 2019, Tropical Depression Amang made its first landfall in Siargao Island. A second landfall happened in Eastern Samar at 19:30 on 21 January.

Prior to Amang's landfall, necessary preparedness was conducted by communities and government offices based on learning from the previous similar forecasts. With an anticipation of significant impact, government authorities carried out pre-emptive evacuation for families living near the coast, riverbanks, landslide prone areas and other vulnerable places. Prior to landfall, there were pre-emptive evacuations for 5,256 families or 21,006 people from the provinces of Labay, Camarines Sur, Masbate, Sorsogon, Eastern Samar, Northern Samar, Souther Leyte, Biliran, Compostela Valley, Agusan del Norte, Dinagat Islands, Surigao del Norte and Surigao del Sur. Part of the preparedness activity was the suspension of classes in 350 cities/municipalities in Regions V, VII, VIII, X and Caraga.

However, after landfall, the actual impact was reported as not being significant and remained within the national capacity of the Local Government Units to respond. The National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) reported a total of 3,760 families or 16,574 people were affected in 58 barangays, 17 cities/municipalities and 5 provinces in Caraga region. There were power interruptions reported in in Camarines Sur and Compostella Valley.

## Summary of response

### Overview of Host National Society

PRC monitored the weather disturbance since it was spotted by weather agencies through its Operations Centre which operates 24/7. In accordance with PRC standard operating procedures, PRC National Headquarters instructed Chapters to be ready to respond up to their required capacity to deliver assistance to affected communities with the basic services – welfare, first aid, etc. Chapters in likely affected areas were informed to take preparedness measures. The Chapters communicated with their Red Cross Action Teams volunteers and community Red Cross Volunteers (RCAT and RCAT143) for information and to start implementing early warning measures as Amang (which was a low-pressure area by then) approaches. National disaster response teams, emergency response units for water, welfare and health services personnel were alerted for possible deployment.

The following Chapters set up welfare desks and first aid stations in different evacuation centres:

- Agusan del Norte in Bugsukan Covered Court
- Albay Chapter in Barangan Panal, Tiwi Central School and Tiwi Community College
- Camarines Sur Chapter in Tambo National High School and Elementary Schools evacuation centre
- Surigao Del Norte Chapter in the Barangays of Lipata, Taft and Canlanipa.
- Southern Leyte Chapter in San Ricardo Port and Liloan Ports

Prior to landfall, as a preparedness activity, with the support of IFRC, PRC National Headquarters deployed non-food items from their disaster preparedness stocks held in Cebu Warehouse to Ozamiz, Misamis Occidental in Mindanao to ensure immediate response support to the Chapters. However, based on assessments of the needs after landfall, these stocks were not distributed.

### Overview of Red Cross Red Crescent Movement in country

PRC works with the IFRC, ICRC and 10 PNS in-country: American Red Cross, Australian Red Cross, Canadian Red Cross, Finnish Red Cross, German Red Cross, Japanese Red Cross Society, The Netherlands Red Cross, Norwegian Red Cross, Spanish Red Cross and Qatar Red Crescent Society. However, PRC was only working with IFRC in this operation.

### Overview of non-RCRC actors in country

#### Coordinating with the authorities

As auxiliary to the public authorities, PRC maintained a strong relationship with government bodies through participation or collaboration with (i) the NDRRMC; (ii) the provincial, municipal and barangay (village) disaster risk reduction and management councils; and (iii) the local government units defined in the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Act from 2010. PRC participated in NDRRMC meetings and coordinated with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD).

## Needs analysis and scenario planning

### Needs analysis

Based on the government data, a total of 3,760 families or 16,574 people were affected in 58 barangays, 17 cities/municipalities, and 5 provinces in Caraga Region. But there was no significant damage to shelter, infrastructure and agriculture reported.

The DSWD through its provincial social welfare and development offices had prepositioned food and non-food items to provide necessary support. PRC Chapter responded with their normal services of welfare and first aid to those affected and those in evacuation centres, etc.

As there was no significant damage to housing, livelihoods, social and mainline infrastructure the response remained within the capacity of the Local Government Units and PRC Chapters with no significant support from PRC National Headquarters.

## B. OPERATIONAL STRATEGY

### Proposed strategy

Through the DREF allocation, PRC was able to preposition non-food items from their disaster preparedness stocks in Cebu Warehouse for up to 1,300 families in Ozamiz City, Misamis Occidental in Mindanao to ensure immediate response support to the Chapters.

#### Narrative description of achievements

In support to the preparations done by PRC (mobilisation of assets and volunteers) for the possibility of a larger response for Tropical Depression Amang, IFRC launched the DREF at CHF 42,500. PRC was able to mobilize disaster preparedness stocks for up to 1,300 families (1,300 sets hygiene kits; 2,600 pieces jerry cans; 2,600 pieces mosquito nets; 2,600 pieces blankets; 2,600 sleeping mats and 2,600 pieces tarpaulins) from Cebu Warehouse to Ozamiz City, Misamis Occidental in Mindanao. The stocks were delivered through two rented 10-wheeler trucks from Cebu Regional Warehouse.



Transportation of these NFIs was organized in close coordination with PRC Logistics Department and Disaster Management Services Department.

Based on the government data, a total of 3,760 families or 16,574 people were affected in 58 barangays, 17 cities/municipalities, and 5 provinces in Caraga Region. But there was no significant damage to shelter, infrastructure and agriculture reported.

The DSWD through its provincial social welfare and development offices had prepositioned food and non-food items to provide necessary support. PRC Chapters responded with their normal services of welfare, first aid to those affected and those in evacuation centres, etc.

As there was no significant damage to housing, livelihoods, social and mainline infrastructure, the response remained within the capacity of the Local Government Units and PRC Chapters with no significant support from PRC National Headquarters required.

As such, the NFIs were not distributed. The NFIs will now remain in Ozamiz City, Misamis Occidental in Mindanao as part of PRC preparedness plans for Mindanao supported by IFRC.

### Lessons Learned

The early launching of DREF as part of the preparedness activities to support PRC on their response was a good mechanism which should be replicated in the future.

<p>PRC provided updates to its in-country partners, including the IFRC Philippine country office which supported PRC in disseminating updates to the IFRC Asia Pacific regional office, Movement partners, and had coordinated with the Humanitarian Country Team. In addition, the country office coordinated, including about possible security issues in the likely affected areas of Mindanao and eastern Visayas. The IFRC Asia Pacific regional office coordinated the plans of PRC and the IFRC Philippine country office with other partners and throughout the Secretariat.</p> <p>At country level, PRC and IFRC are observers to, and participate in, meetings of the Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) held both during disasters and non-emergency times. PRC and IFRC are involved in relevant government-led cluster information sharing, planning, and analysis at all levels while IFRC supports PRC coordination efforts through representation in other relevant clusters as required.</p> <p>As the response remained within the capacity of the Local Government Units and PRC Chapters, no RDRT was required.</p>

<p>IFRC has a security focal point and an updated security guideline in place. There were no security issues identified during the mobilization of DP stocks. But in all operations, the IFRC security framework has been applied. With regards PRC staff and volunteers, the National Society's security framework applied. For this DREF operational areas, there were no security threats happened during the implementation.</p>		

## D. THE BUDGET

The total budget for this operation was CHF 42,500 of which CHF 5,308 (12 per cent) was spent. The balance of CHF 37,192 will be returned to the DREF. Only 12 per cent of the overall budget was spent since the expenditure was only used for the mobilization of the non-food items from Cebu Regional Warehouse to Ozamiz in Mindanao.

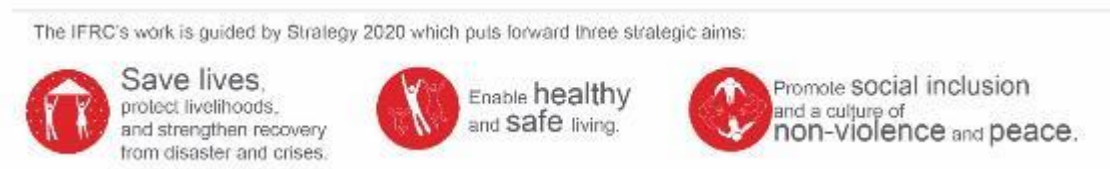
