## A. Situation analysis

### Description of the disaster

Extreme weather conditions have hit the West Bank and Gaza Strip starting on Saturday 18/1/2020 including heavy rain floods, winds, and low-temperature cold wave. The heavy rain generated floods in several part of Palestine and thousands of people were affected with many families being evacuated from their homes. The extreme weather conditions resulted in the deaths of 3 people; two in the Gaza Strip and one in Jerusalem due to the heavy rains and flooding.

The weather events have deeply affected local communities, particularly in the Gaza Strip where thousands of people already remain displaced and live in semi-structured or transitional shelters or tents due to loss of their homes during the recent escalation in hostilities. For the first time in the Gaza Strip, the temperature approached zero at night at a time where it is not possible to operate the heating systems due to electricity cuts. Furthermore, gas stations in the Gaza Strip had insufficient fuel to provide to people to operate their own generators. Additionally, vendors providing cooking gas had insufficient stock.

In the West Bank especially the Bedouin communities in the Jordan Valley, communities living close to the Israeli separation wall, as well as vulnerable communities residing specifically in the old cities and areas close to streams across the West Bank such as Hebron, Jerusalem, Jenin, Qalqilia, Ramallah, Tubas, and Nablus have been affected by the heavy rain fall. The cold wave was exceptional in its nature, with very strong winds and rains, and temperatures (approx. 3C) which were uncharacteristically low for Palestine.

Based on the weather forecast which included storms, on the 13th January, the Palestinian Government has called for "collaboration and common efforts to support the affected populations to face the current challenges". As Palestine Red Crescent Society (PRCS) is a member of the High Council of Civil Defence, and due to its auxiliary role, it subsequently responded to the humanitarian needs.

## Summary of the current response

### Overview of Host National Society Response Action

PRCS has activated its operation rooms on the 18th January in the West Bank (WB) and Gaza strip since the beginning of January 2020 in preparation for the arrival of the expected heavy rain fall while PRCS emergency teams have been on standby to respond to the emerging needs.

PRCS has been able to identify the needs of the communities affected by the cold wave, both in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip and responded accordingly. The two operation rooms in WB and Gaza Strip have been activated, rapid assessments on the ground have been conducted and close coordination with partners and services providers on the ground has been undertaken. PRCS volunteers and staff lead the response actions in the affected communities despite harsh conditions.

The PRCS has deployed more than 600 specialized volunteers to respond during the operation together with technical staff from the Disaster Management Unit, Logistic, Psychosocial Support and Emergency Medical Services departments respectively. Emergency response operations focused on the provision of relief and household items, including tarpaulins, tents, mattresses, and blankets among several other items.

During the cold wave since mid -January (18 Jan), PRCS has distributed relief items for 883 families as per the following table:

## Overview of Red Cross Red Crescent Movement Actions in country

Since the onset of the emergency there has been ongoing coordination between PRCS, the Palestinian Civil Defence, local and national authorities, including governorates and municipalities, UN agencies as well as within the RCRC Movement. Furthermore, PRCS is a member of the Palestinian National Civil Defence committee and present as well at the Governorate level. There are 5 core field assessors who are also the focal points tasked with inputting needs information into the online system, these are: OCHA, UNRWA, the Civil Defence, Governorates and PRCS.

The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) is present in Palestine to support PRCS's development and to promote enhanced and coordinated Disaster Preparedness in case of disasters and emergencies in addition to longer term organizational development, capacity building and resilience.

PRCS, International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and IFRC will work together to consolidate their various methods for assistance and to avoid overlapping. The present Disaster Relief Emergency Fund (DREF) constitutes immediate support to PRCS to strengthen its operational capacity to enable the National Society (NS) to continue responding to the most urgent humanitarian needs.

The ICRC humanitarian response in the occupied Palestinian territory focuses on emergency health and care through supporting PRCS EMS on an annual basis and support to the MoH, and when needed; non-food items distribution, protection of civilians and assistance of persons affected by armed conflict, in addition to dissemination of International Humanitarian Law to parties to the conflict and conducting visits to people in detention, as well as water and sanitation activities.

There are presently 11 Partner National Societies cooperating with the PRCS in a series of programs: Danish, German, Italian, Netherlands, Qatari, Spanish, Swedish, Turkish, Icelandic, Canadian, Kuwaiti. Currently PRCS is receiving 'winterisation relief support' from the Kuwait Red Crescent Society & Qatar Red Crescent Society which is for marginalized communities in both the West Bank and Gaza Strip. However, the two programs will not overlap with the DREF targeted areas, since the previous mentioned funds from KRCS and QRCS will target the families facing a challenging economic situation or families that have had their homes demolished by the occupation forces. The DREF relief will focus on the people who have been affected by the extreme weather conditions in the current cold wave. PRCS will ensure that all assistance will be based on a field assessment that is conducted by the DRR team in coordination with local authorities and community members.

The PRCS had also bilateral meetings with all of its partners and establishes coordination mechanisms among headquarters and branches for need assessment and response.

## Overview of non-RCRC actors' actions in country

PRCS held several meetings with WHO and Ministry of Health related to support to area C i.e full IL control over planning, security and construction (on health, nutrition, Psychosocial programme support and resilience). The coordination is focused on the intervention with mobile clinics and also relief support in order to prevent duplication of efforts and promote division of tasks.

### Needs analysis, targeting, scenario planning and risk assessment

#### Needs analysis

Since the beginning of the cold wave, communities in the Gaza Strip and the West Bank have experienced flooding and cold temperatures. The Palestinian Government has called for collaborative efforts to support the affected populations.

In responding to the situation, DRR teams received calls from community members, affected families and Civil Defence regarding the situation. The teams visited the affected areas, families or houses, and completed an assessment and then responded accordingly. (The table above outlines the number of families reached as a result of the assessment process). PRCS has also revised the Vulnerability and Capacity Assessment (VCA) tools that were previously prepared to better respond to the crisis. After consultations with various actors in the field and based on the immediate responses to the humanitarian calls, PRCS has been able to identify the needs of the community facing the cold wave, both in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. The PRCS conducted needs assessments focusing on relief and shelter related household items, including tarpaulins, mattresses, and blankets among several other items.

#### Targeting

PRCS will provide relief and shelter assistance up to 2,000 affected families by the weather, as since the initial response PRCS has continued to provide relief items as well as receive requests for assistance (1,500 in Gaza and 500 in West Bank). The relief efforts will be carried out in coordination within the Red Cross Red Crescent Movement, relevant sectors, such as Civil Defence, OCHA, UNRWA among others.

#### Scenario planning

The DREF request primarily targets partial replenishment of PRCS stocks to replace distributed items from PRCS stocks. Thus, as the on-going operation is utilising PRCS stocks, the current DREF support will help ensure the continuation of the ongoing response to meet current needs.

Moreover, the DREF will help equip PRCS emergency teams with the necessary Personal Protection Equipment (waterproof shoes and clothes) to ensure safety of volunteers during interventions.

Awareness activities in targeted communities on basic safe shelter are also included under this DREF operation.

## The key activities planned as part of this operation are:

- Revision of initial need assessment in target areas according with updated situation
- Procurement of supplies
- Replenishment of the PRCS emergency stocks already distributed
- Ongoing needs assessments according to the evolving situation
- Distribution of additional items based on needs assessment
- PPE for PRCS volunteers
- Printing of awareness raising materials
- Monitoring, evaluation and reporting

## Operation Risk Assessment

The assessment teams and responders may face some challenges to access the affected areas due to the roads being blocked by the snow and continuous rain. Also, if the bad weather conditions continue, available resources will not be enough which will pose a challenge in meeting humanitarian needs. In that case the response plan may be revised accordingly.

## B. Operational strategy

### Overall Operational objective:

The population in the affected areas will receive support to cope with the effects of the cold wave through the provision of household items and emergency shelter.

### Human resources

The PRCS has deployed 600 volunteers since the beginning of their response. 120 volunteers will be insured and geared with protective equipment enabling them to continue running the operation together with technical staff from Disaster Management, Logistic, PSP and Health. The cost of the volunteer's transport and incentives will be included, additionally the IFRC insurance system are included under this DREF operation. IFRC country representation office will support the follow up and reporting of the operation

### Logistics and supply chain

Logistic support to the intervention will be provided following IFRC procedures to source and procure relief items and to ensure the efficient and timely distribution to affected beneficiaries. IFRC in the country and MENA Region will support PRCS when is needed.

## **Communications**

Information on the operation will be disseminated in coordination with the IFRC and Movement partners in order to highlight the response to the humanitarian needs and the evolving and emerging humanitarian concerns. IFRC in the country and MENA region will provide support to PRCS including a potential communications surge deployment. Information will also be shared via the IFRC Go Platform. Additionally, PRCS has been strengthening its capacity in CEA through recent staff training and will use this knowledge to integrate CEA throughout the intervention to ensure maximum and meaningful participation of affected communities to ensure accountability of the operation by addressing potential complaints/feedback from the target households and non-target communities.

## **Security**

The West Bank and Gaza Strip are very different operational security contexts. Military operations occur frequently in Gaza and as a result, Un Exploded Ordinance pose a risk. Civil unrest is frequent and can quickly turn violent. Access to, from and within the Gaza Strip is frequently restricted. In the West Bank, civil unrest is common, often linked with events inside the Gaza Strip. For both the Gaza Strip and the West Bank, personnel must stay abreast of the local sentiment and broader regional context. In order to undertake the planned activities, PRCS will coordinate with ICRC and evaluate the evolving security situation. The IFRC Regional Security Coordinator may provide remote support as needed.

## **Planning, monitoring, evaluation, & reporting (PMER)**

PMER will be crucial to the delivery of the planned operation to ensure evidence-based reporting, upholding accountability and compliance with the established standards. In this regards monitoring is required regularly by the PRCS to track the effects and impact of response actions, track progress of activities and the delivery of outputs. A DREF training for PRCS will be included to ensure EPoA updates will be published in due course of the operation. A final report will be published 3 months after the end of the operation. Also, a Lessons Learned workshop is planned for to document challenges and successes of this DREF for future operations.

## **Administration and Finance**

The PRCS will be responsible for managing the funds in accordance with standards practices for IFRC on operational transfers. The IFRC through the country representation office and finance department in MENA will provide necessary operational support for review, validation of budgets, bank transfers, and technical assistance to the National Societies on procedures for justification of expenditures, including the review and validation of invoices.

## C. Detailed Operational Plan



### **Shelter**

**People targeted: 10,000 (2,000 HHs)**

**Requirements (CHF): 196,470**

#### Needs analysis:

Affected families by the extreme weather conditions have lost household items with their houses partially damaged. PRCS as the primary actor in the emergency relief phase, has responded to the floods and cold wave affected people by providing HH items, including (till date) winter blankets (1,776), mattresses (1,119), kitchen sets (149), kerosene heaters (149), tarpaulins (1,489), and jerry cans (149). Therefore, PRCS will be supported to continue their ongoing relief operations through partial replenishment of PRCS stocks for blankets (2,000), mattresses (1,500), tarpaulins (1,500), heaters (100 gas, 100 electric), and kitchen sets (200) to restock PRCS contingency storage.

Population to be assisted: PRCS will provided relief and shelter assistance to 2,000 affected families (1,500 in Gaza and 500 in West Bank) in coordination with the Red Cross Red Crescent Movement, relevant factors, such as Civil Defence, OCHA, UNRWA among others. At the same time PRCS will sensitize population on key prevention actions through awareness raising materials.

Programme standards/benchmarks: Sphere / national standards are observed. Procurement of HH items will be done in accordance to Federation standards and requirements.

## Water, sanitation and hygiene

People targeted: 1,000 (200 HHs)

Requirements (CHF): 3,929

Needs analysis: Amongst the identified needs of the affected people by the weather events as per the initial assessment, 421 hygiene kits have been distributed in different areas. Partial replenishment (200 hygiene kits) will be included under this DREF to restock PRCS contingency storage.

Population to be assisted: 421 families have been reached with hygiene kits following to loss of most of hygiene items as per the assessment.

Programme standards/benchmarks: Sphere / national standards are observed. Procurement of hygiene items will be done in accordance to Federation standards and requirements.




