Appeal target (current):
CHF 32,311,219

Appeal coverage:

Multilateral contributions technically channelled through the IFRC Secretariat reach a 26 per cent coverage of the Appeal's budget. The global appeal coverage is 46 per cent, including bilateral and multilateral contributions.

Due to the extension of the appeal by three months, further contributions from the donor community continue to be more than welcome.



The Turkish Red Crescent Society is the main humanitarian organization in the country. Since the beginning of the operation TRC has cooperated with the Turkish Government in delivering relief services to protected Syrian population, including the provision of food for children and families.

Appeal history:

- This emergency appeal was launched on 9 November 2012 for CHF 32,311,219 for six months to assist 170,000 people.
- Operations Updates were published on 21 December 2012 (Operations Update n°1) and on 31 January 2013 (Operations Update n°2).
- The current Operations Update announces the extension of the Appeal timeframe until 31 August 2013.
- A Revised Appeal will be issued by the end of May 2013 focusing on long term support for up to 400,000 Syrian people residing in Turkey, matching the evolving needs of the regional crisis.

Summary: Since the beginning of the internal crisis in Syria, some 1,420,000 Syrian citizens have fled from the country to neighbouring countries. By early May 2013, the estimated number of Syrian people living in Turkey is 324,731.¹ UNHCR figures report 193,303 Syrian people living under temporary protection of the Turkish Administration in 17 camps. UNCHR projects that by the end of the year 2013 there will be 1,000,000 Syrian people taking shelter in Turkey.

The Turkish Red Crescent (TRC), supported by partner institutions, assists the Turkish Government's operation for the temporarily protected Syrian people sheltered in Turkey, while delivering humanitarian services in the areas of food and non-food item distribution, shelter, and sanitation (showers and toilets). As the number of

Syrian people increases, the TRC will increment the level of operations for attending to around 210,000 people in a total of 23 camps (5 of them under construction). The support will increase and include all relief activities not limiting itself to winterization actions for the originally expected target of 150,000 people. In this sense, TRC is also extending the timeframe of its operations until 31 August 2013.

Within the framework of this project the Turkish Red Crescent is working in line with its auxiliary role in cooperation with the Turkish Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Presidency (AFAD), the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Education and the Governorates of the provinces where the camps are established. International actors, such as UNHCR, WFP, UNICEF, UNFPA and IOM are also present and cooperate with Turkish Red Crescent.

The global appeal coverage is 46 per cent, including bilateral and multilateral contributions. The 26 per cent technical coverage is based on multilateral cash contributions channelled through the IFRC Secretariat. So far, the American Red Cross, the United States Government, the Danish Red Cross (through the Danish Government), the Estonian Government, the European Commission Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection (ECHO), the Irish Government, the Japanese Red Cross Society, the Kuwait Red Crescent Society, the Red Cross of Monaco, the Swedish Red Cross and the Swiss Red Cross (also with the Swiss Government's allocation) and the Canadian Red Cross Society (through the Canadian Government) are the main multilateral contributors to the operation. Other National Societies are also encouraged to contact the IFRC Europe Zone Office.

The Turkish Red Crescent has received bilateral contributions from the following partners: German Red Cross, Bulgarian Red Cross, British Red Cross, Swedish Red Cross, Netherlands Red Cross, Norwegian Red Cross, IOM, UNICEF, UNFPA, WFP and UNHCR.

The situation

The Syrian crisis continues to cause extensive damage to Syria and the Syrian people's security. UNHCR figures for the region depict 1,419,430 people fleeing to the neighbouring countries.² Out of this figure around 850,000 people have moved during 2013. At 2 May 2013, the estimated number of Syrian people living in Turkey is 322,609.³ Updated UNHCR projects 192,970 Syrian citizens living in 17 camps, in eight provinces under the temporary protection of the Government of Turkey.

The following chart depicts the dispersion of the protected Syrian population living in camps by mid April 2013:

Due to the growing number of Syrian people arriving in Turkey, the AFAD has shared plans to open five new camps to accommodate around 210,000 people.

While the cold weather conditions in the camps have improved since the launch of the appeal, there is a need for preparing for the hot summer in the following months as well as to continue providing services to the protected population.

Coordination and partnerships

Coordination with authorities:

The overall coordination of the relief activities for the Syrian population in Turkey is led by the AFAD and the Turkish Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Since the beginning of the operation, the responsibility of camp management and other services in the camps has equipped the local Governorates as well as local AFAD bodies in the provinces and line ministries with the relevant expertise. The Turkish Ministry of Health provides medical services in the camps, while the Turkish Ministry of Education administers education for Syrian children. Since the beginning of the operation, the Turkish Red Crescent has supported AFAD in the supply of relief services including food and non-food relief item distribution and supply of shelter items and materials. Currently TRC and the AFAD are working on the fine-tuning of tasks and competencies.

Inter-agency coordination:

The Turkish Red Crescent and the AFAD work in close coordination and channel together the initiatives of various partners.

The Turkish Red Crescent continues cooperation with UNHCR Syrian Humanitarian Relief Operation. UNHCR has donated funds for producing 18,500 tents, and contributed to procure 2,260 hot-plate cookers, 3,760 mini-fridges and 3,760 shelves. The hot-plates have already been procured and distributed by TRC, also the mini-fridges and shelves' tendering process has been completed and the delivery to the sites just started. UNHCR also supports an E-Voucher food programme (Turkish Red Crescent and WFP led joint-venture programmes) by providing financial support to the TRC so as to purchase related kitchen items such as hot plates, shelves and mini fridges in all camps, where electric facilities were upgraded as per the pertaining safety standards.

The TRC-WFP joint E-Voucher Food Programme will be extended to all container camps and tented camps. It has already been extended to Harran camp starting since 1 March 2013 and Nizip-2 camp starting since 1 April 2013, as well as extended to Islahiye, Nizip-1, Karkamış and Adana tent camps on 15 April.

In addition to the paper-based E-Vouchers, there is an e-card in use as an alternative to the distribution of cooked meals to people living in the above mentioned camps. Given the provision of cooking tools at some of the camps, this alternative allows target families to have more freedom when choosing the products they want to eat. It also allows TRC for better accountability of the delivery of food humanitarian assistance. The e-cards assign for each person the sum of 80TL (50 USD) per month, and the recipients can purchase the chosen basic products in the stores functioning within the camps. The e-cards cannot be used to buy anything but food in the designated stores. In Hatay, the stores are located outside the camps. These suppliers have been chosen in coordination with local authorities through a transparent selection process. The stores are closely monitored by TRC and WFP.

Movement Coordination:

Contributions from Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement partners have allowed TRC to make the current procurement and distribution of relief items. The second bilateral in-kind support of the German Red Cross enabled TRC to carry out the distribution of 30,000 blankets and 10,000 hygiene kits. Bilateral contribution from the British Red Cross targets approximately 20-25,000 people in three camps with the provision of tarpaulins, electric heaters, kitchen sets and mattresses. The bilateral contribution from the Netherlands Red Cross reached approximately 100,000 people by distributing hot plate cookers, kitchen sets, blankets and hygiene parcels. The Norwegian Red Cross support allowed the TRC to procure and distribute hot meals in Gaziantep-Karkamış. The Swedish Red Cross supported the target population with an in-kind contribution of 6,800 blankets for Osmaniye-Cevdetiye camp. The support channelled through the IFRC appeal covers those

operational expenses which are crucial for the timely delivery of assistance to the vulnerable people. It has also allowed for the purchase of mattresses, items for winterization and non-food items (NFI).

Red Cross and Red Crescent action

Progress towards outcomes

Relief distributions (food and basic non-food items)

Outcome 1: 100,000 temporary protected people residing in temporary camps will have received non food relief items to increase their resilience during the winter time

Outcome 2: Up to 20,000 vulnerable people at the Turkish-Syrian border will have received urgent food and non-food relief items

Outcome 3: NFI contingency stocks for 50,000 people will be procured and pre-positioned in case of deterioration of the humanitarian situation and an increased influx of temporary protected people.

Progress on Outcome 1: 100,000 temporary protected people residing in temporary camps will have received non food relief items to increase their resilience during the winter time

By 30 April 2013, the TRC has supported the distribution of 44,574 tents, 25,790 tarpaulins, 567,022 blankets, 52,730 kitchen sets, 87,177 hygiene sets, 199,268 mattresses, 424 container showers, 199,918 diaper packs, 275,532 units of baby formula food, 165,303 units of bed linens, 1,734,766 units of clothes, 17,750 hot plate cookers and 16,284 heaters. These figures do not include relief items prepositioned in camp warehouses and TRC general warehouses. They represent a fixed stock and, in the case of more durable items such as tents, when replaced due to usage, are not double-counted.⁴ In addition to this, with support of ECHO, the TRC has purchased and distributed in all the camps the following items in order to increase the protected people's resilience: 73,117 underwear units, 48,308 pijamas, 123,458 pairs of socks, 11,805 V-neck shirts, 153,568 U-neck shirts, and 23,438 scarves.

With the improvement of the weather conditions, the operations will start focusing on providing sustainable relief services to the protected population. A revision of the appeal to be launched by end of May 2013 will depict activities to match this longer term approach.

Progress on Outcome 2: Up to 20,000 vulnerable people at the Turkish-Syrian border will have received urgent food and non-food relief items

The Turkish Red Crescent Society is carrying out relief efforts from its own resources and multilateral funding for providing assistance to the Syrian population outside the camps. The TRC does not carry out cross-border actions. These activities are carried out in coordination with Syrian grassroots organizations (as organized communities) and local associations, inasmuch as relief assistance is transferred at border points within Turkish territory. After the items are transferred, the Syrian partner organizations carry out the distribution in Syria. The assistance is provided at the request of these organized groups of Syrian people. Given the dimensions of the conflict, the TRC encourages humanitarian organizations to further contribute to these activities.

The below table shows the overall size of the operation of the Turkish RC in connection with the on-going crisis in Syria.

Progress on Outcome 3: NFI contingency stocks for 50,000 people will be procured and pre-positioned in case of deterioration of the humanitarian situation and an increased influx of temporary protected people.

The procurement of some contingency items is under way. While some of the items will remain stocked, most of the items, currently under production, will be assigned to the new camps. As the preparation of camps is underway, distribution figures will be submitted with the following operations update. UNHCR contributed with funds for producing 18,500 tents that have been dispatched for the newly establish camps as well as for replenishments of the existing tents that need to be replaced due to usage.

No stock has been built because the limited available funding received in response to the current appeal was used to meet the most important current priorities.

National Society capacity-building

Outcome: National Society HQ and responding branches have received support for their infrastructure and well-functioning.

Progress: Currently, a draft translation into Turkish of the IFRC security tools is under progress. After revision, the printing may begin in July 2013. The translator for the SPHERE handbook has been identified and translation into Turkish has begun, coordinations for the IMPACT training in Turkey are under way in cooperation with the Learning and Research Department in Geneva.

This course will help the highly experienced Turkish RC staff get acquainted with the Federation`s international operational rules and standards, and it will also further enhance the cooperation between the Turkish RC and the Federation, and pave the way for the involvement of skilled Turkish Red Crescent personnel in the Federation`s multilateral programmes.

A Federation Delegate, assigned to the Turkish Red Crescent with the aim of assisting during the reporting and communications aspects of this operation, arrived in Ankara at the end of February 2013 and started the implementation of the following responsibilities:

- Coordination and information-sharing with Movement partners and other humanitarian agencies through bi-weekly Fact Sheets on operational progress.
- Introducing a standardized reporting template for donor reporting.
- Establishing close working contacts with all humanitarian actors operating in Turkey.
