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DREF final report Egypt: Civil Unrest

The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent (IFRC) Disaster Relief Emergency Fund (DREF) is a source of un-earmarked money created by the Federation in 1985 to ensure that immediate financial support is available for Red Cross Red Crescent response to emergencies. The DREF is a vital part of the International Federation's disaster response system and increases the ability of National Societies to respond to disasters.

Summary: CHF 199,421 was allocated from the IFRC's Disaster Relief Emergency Fund (DREF) on 17 August 2013 to support the national society in delivering assistance to some 3,000 beneficiaries, or to replenish disaster preparedness stocks.

As several protests and violence erupted in Egypt on 14 August 2013 following the ousting of President Mohamed Morsi; the escalations led to the killing of more 638 people and injuring hundreds of civilians. The Egyptian Red Crescent deployed its Emergency Action Teams to provide medical care and evacuate the injured people.

The DREF operation aims to support the most essential activities of the Egyptian Red Crescent on the field in providing basic and essential lifesaving services through the Emergency Action Teams, who are involved in difficult and dangerous actions.

By this DREF, the Egyptian Red Crescent was abled to increase the number of the Emergency action teams and the number of the National Disaster Response Team (NDRT) by all necessary supplies and equipments as well as condacted training courses on first aid for its volunteers and youth. In addition 300 ERC volunteers (field teams) covered by IFRC Global Insurance Program till December 2013.

These activities increased the capacity building of the Egyptian Red Crescent to confort any disturbances, clashes and emergency situations that required immediate humanitarian assistances.

The situation

The on-going instability and uncertainty climate after the dismissal of the president Mohamed Morsi on June 30, 2013, has led to further political protests and strikes with several sit-in camps installed by both pro and opposition groups. Criminal activities have been on the rise in different locations taking advantage of the security situation.

According to the Egyptian Ministry of Health, more than 638 people have lost their lives and more than 3,700 people were injured after the escalations of protests on 14 August 2013, with clashes, not only in Cairo but in other governorates.

ERC coordinated with the Egyptian Ambulances Organization in the site of the events to evacuate those in need of higher-level care. Also coordinated with the stockholders in the site of the events; police, army, field hospitals and governmental authorities.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action

ERC responded to the humanitarian needs around mass demonstrations and has immediately deployed its emergency action teams (each team consists of 1 doctor and 4 first aiders, equipped with the essential equipment such as stretcher and FA kits) to help those injured and wounded on the streets of Cairo and other provinces.

The type of response differed in each governorates according to the needs. Some ERC branches provided other services and initiatives as a response to the situation in their governorates during the demonstrations that include:

- Visiting the injured people in the hospitals to provide them with psychosocial support and new clothes.
- Purchasing oxygen cylinders to provide the injured with oxygen when needed in the first aid post.
- Putting 23 posters in the main squares of the governorate that call for acting peacefully during the demonstrations.
- Conducting blood donation campaigns.
- Raising the awareness about the role of the Egyptian Red Crescent, its activities, its humanitarian principles, and opportunities of volunteers, emphasizing on the neutrality and impartiality of services delivery and to facilitate the mission of ERC

Achievements against outcomes

The operation proposed to support the most essential activities of the Egyptian Red Crescent on the field in providing basic but essential lifesaving services through the Emergency Action Teams, who are involved in difficult and dangerous actions assisting the victims of violence in Egypt, more than 200 – 250 volunteers benefited from the trainings courses through this DREF.

Emergency health

Outcome: The health risks of the emergency on the affected population is reduced through the provision of first aid, medical evacuation and minor treatment to at least 3000 people up to 4 months

Output 1:

- Affected people received first aid services and basic medical treatment in a neutral and impartial environment.
- Serious cases received medical evacuation to hospitals in close coordination with the Egyptian Ambulances Organization in the site of the events.
- Field hospitals in the site of the event are established by voluntary doctors from the public with medical consumables.

Output 2:

- ERC provided supplies for the Emergency Action Teams (EAT):
 - Uniform for 100 members of EAT.
 - Protective and safety equipment (masks for tear gas) to ensure the safety of EAT in the field.
 - Oxygen cylinders, stretchers and ice packs to help the teams during they offered their services in the field.
 - Manikins for practical session, skeletons and human skeleton charts as illustrative means for the first aid training courses for EAT and ERC youth and volunteers and others.
- ERC provided to the field Hospital in the site of the events by the medical supplies and consumables.
- 300 ERC volunteers (field teams) covered by IFRC Global Insurance Program till December 2013.
- ERC held the following training courses:
 - Five first aid training courses:
 - 116 ERC volunteers (73 male and 43 female) participated in these training courses. Participants came from ERC branches of Nasr City, Al Galaa, and Zeinhom.
 - Two Emergency Action Team Training courses:
 - 9 EATs (45 participants) are increased through these training courses (41 Male and 04 female). Each team consists of 5 members of ERC volunteers. Participants came from ERC branches of Nasr City, Al Galaa, Zeinhom, Assiout, Portsaid and Menia.
 - One training course to form a National Disaster Response Team (NDRT):
 - 33 ERC volunteers (28 male and 5 female) attended this course. The participants came from ERC branches of Assiout, Bani Sweif, Menia, Marsa Matrouh, South Sinai, Qena, Ismalia, Luxor, Nasr City, Al Galaa, and Zeinhom.
- 1,000 copies of first aid manual in English and 20,000 first aid brochures in Arabic are printed.

By increasing the number of the Emergency Action Teams, the Egyptian Red Crescent was able to deploy during the period from August 2013 till January 2014, 146 EATs in different events in Egypt:

- 30 EATs during demonstrations in Cairo, Alexandria, Portsaid, Suez and Sharkia.
- 15 EATs during match between Egypt and Ghana.
- 3 EATs during social event in Cairo.
- 04 EATs during the trial of former president Mohamed Morsy in police academy.
- 74 EATs during the two days of the referendum on the Egyptian constitution.
- 2 EATs after the explosion of police directorate in Dakahlia Governorate.
- 3 EATs after the explosion of police directorate in Cairo Governorate.
- 15 EATs during the third anniversary of the 25th of January revolution.

EATs during these events offered their services for more than 3,000 beneficiaries.

The teams offered first aid services for 1,472 injured and evacuated 27 injured to the ambulances and hospitals. The teams provided psychosocial support to the victims and their relatives.
