This Operations Update reflects the response of the Libyan Red Crescent to the complex emergency during the period from August 11 until October 31, 2014¹. The operation will be extended until December 11, 2014 in order to allow the implementation of all the planned distribution activities, which were delayed due to the growing security threats in Libya.

Summary:

The security situation in Libya has been highly volatile since May and, combined with the political instability related to the transition in the country, is now deteriorating. The increase of the security incidents has caused hundreds to be killed and wounded across a number of communities across the country, particularly around Benghazi and Tripoli, clashes move recently to the mountain areas in the west. Since October, weeks it became even more difficult to get accurate data of the casualties of the conflicts in Tripoli and Benghazi, in addition to data of displaced people due to frequent and quick changes in the dynamics of the conflict. People living in the areas directly affected by the fighting in Benghazi and Tripoli are trying to move to safer areas, while others remain trapped. Libyan Red Crescent Society (LRCS) staff and volunteers are risking their lives to help evacuate those trapped, who had been locked until fighting calmed down. In October, over 15,000 Libyan families have been reported to be displaced from their homes in the conflict areas not to count the displaced families who did not register or seek support; displaced families have dispersed in different direction inside Libya. Thousands of families have fled the conflicts into neighbouring countries including Tunisia.

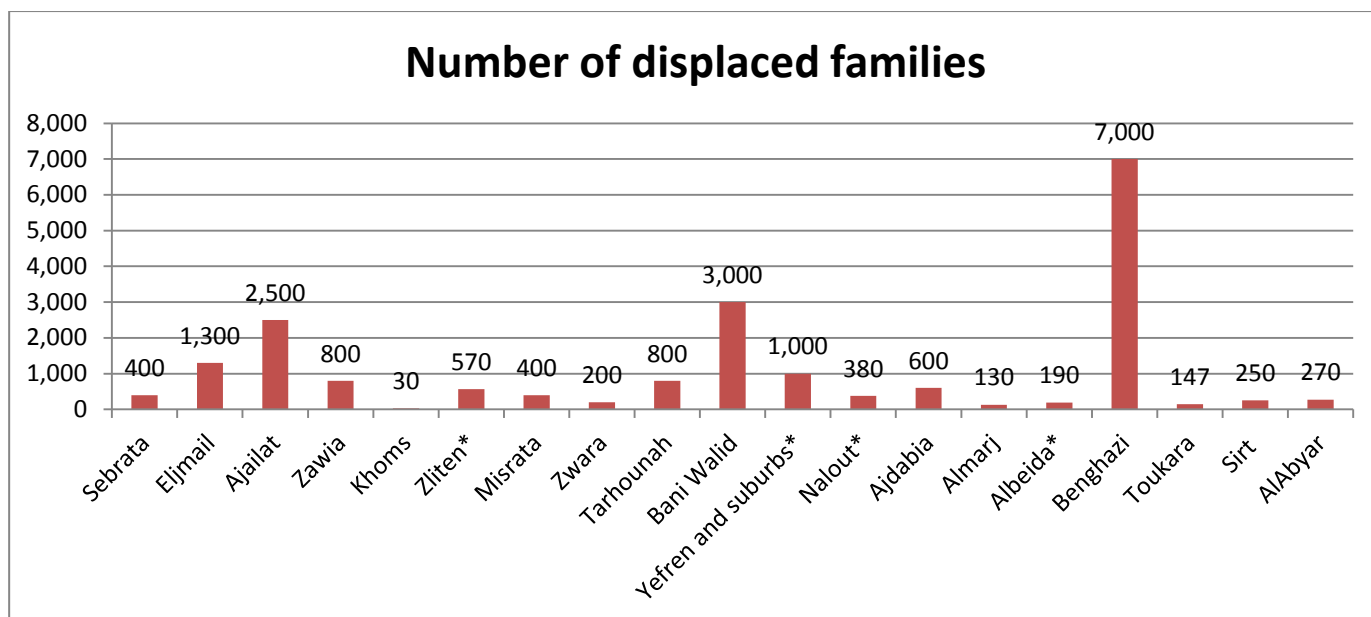


Figure 1: Number of displaced families as of October 12, 2014

Coordination and partnerships

The LRCS convene a daily Disaster Management Coordination Committee meeting to ensure effective coordination and information sharing. The Disaster Management Coordination Committee analyses, plans and coordinates the response, as well as strengthens coordination and partnership with internal and external stakeholders. The committee supports the National Society to identify ideal locations where relief supplies can be procured and pre-positioned for rapid response to the needs of displaced families, plans the timely provision of relief supplies to affected populations and advises on continuous improvements to mechanisms for responding to disasters. It also puts in place preparedness/mitigation measures to alleviate the suffering of the displaced families and host communities, with early warning information collection and analysis, the IFRC will deliver two urgent workshops to the LRCS and TRCS staff on Logistics and information management.

The UN family in Libya has launched its appeal in September seeking 35.25 million US dollars, out of which 15 Million for food security.

Operational implementation

Overview

In October, LRCS volunteers continued their emergency response operations towards the vulnerable within the conflict areas. In Benghazi, LRCS has partaken in the search operations for dozens of persons who went missing. They have also contributed to the evacuation of around 150 internationals from the danger zone in Garyounis areas most of them University professors from different nationalities, dead body management of the victims who were involved in the ongoing fighting and civilians and provided first aid continuously since the clashes first started.

In Ajdabia, LRCS has provided around 160 tents for displaced families fleeing the ongoing fighting in Benghazi, distributed among them blankets, mattresses and urgent food aid. Similarly, in Obari, LRCS has provided safe passage for over 350 people fleeing the ongoing clashes in the south.

The IFRC is in continuous contact and communication with the LRCS and the Tunisian Red Crescent Society (TRCS) to monitor the situation. Urgent funds were made available from the IFRC and the ICRC to the TRCS in order to respond immediately to the urgent food aid needed on the border; LRCS branches in the west, mainly Zwara branch have started operations using their own resources.

Upon the approval of the DREF, LRCS SG and Head of International made a visit to the Regional office in Tunis to discuss and agree on implementation plans; the first allocation of cash was made available to the LRCS to facilitate the local procurement based on the agreed plan. A procurement committee was formed and LRCS launched the process of obtaining five generators which were distributed among the following LRCS branches: Zwara, Nalut, Zawya, Tarhuna and Beni Walid. These branches' work was, indeed, constantly hindered by the continuous electricity outage.

The Disaster Management Coordination Committee has also purchased 2,000 mattresses and 2,000 pillows and distributed them as follows to cover the needs on the basis of reaching the most vulnerable:

Furthermore, 2,000 blankets, 1,000 kitchen sets, 100 first aid kits and 3,000 food parcels are in the process of being delivered from the IFRC Global Logistics Services Office, expected to arrive in the first week of

November. The original plan was to procure food from Tunis; however this plan was changed due to the administrative approvals were taking longer than expected. For this reason, it has been agreed with LRCS to go for the global procurement specifically regarding food. Regarding other items, it had been agreed from the start to make global procurement through the IFRC global logistic Unit.

Procuring food from the local market was ruled out as this would burden the local market and the limited availability of items.

Procuring items from the IFRC Global Logistics Services Office also witnessed some delays related to the delivery destination. In fact, the preferred destination was Benghazi, where the LRCS headquarters is situated. However, it turned out to be impossible go through the Benghazi port as it is targeted by different parties of the ongoing fighting. The same problem was faced while delivering goods from to Tobrog and Tripoli. The available routes turned out to be Misrata port, where the food parcels, the kitchen sets and the blankets will be delivered by sea; and Mitiga airport where the first aid kits will be delivered by air.

As part of the overall response, LRCS is also working in collaboration with the ICRC in providing urgent medical care to the most vulnerable. Food parcels procured locally by the ICRC were distributed to the affected areas in the west. Another visit of the acting Secretary General, the Operation manager, and the head of International was facilitated by the IFRC North Africa regional office to further discuss obstacles and find solutions for difficulties hindering the implementation, an intensive procurement workshop was delivered to the LRCS operation manager, TRCS and IFRC team also attended this intensive 4 hour course, another TRCS, LRCS logistic training in foreseen mid-November.
