Other partner organizations actively involved in the operation: Tunisian authorities activated the National Disaster Management Team and dispatched police forces, civil defence, army and rescue teams to some regions in response to the crisis.	

A. SITUATION ANALYSIS

Description of the disaster

On Saturday 19 March and following recent climatic fluctuations, torrential rain hit the north-west of Tunisia. According to Tunisia's National Institute of Meteorology, the centre of the country and central-west regions including Siliana, Kairouan, Gafsa, Sidi Bouzid, Jendouba, Beja, El Kef, and Kasserine, recorded 60 mm and 80 mm of rain over four days, to locally reach an accumulative level 120 mm of rain. The country's Civil Protection announced the death of an elderly woman in the governorate of Siliana and a second person is missing in the governorate of Kairouan. TRC teams reported three destroyed houses in Kairouan and two in Siliana as an impact of the heavy rain.

Consequently, floodwater surged through many different districts, damaging infrastructure, houses, properties, and livelihoods in the affected areas. Moreover, crops and fruit trees were damaged by the heavy rain, and electricity has been cut off in some districts.

Based on the TRC rapid assessments conducted in coordination with the local authorities, more than **4,000** people have been affected by the floods. Some of them fled their homes seeking shelter in neighbouring high-ground houses and villages, while others opted to stay in their damaged houses and move to rooftops rather than risk crossing flooded areas to reach evacuation points. Water supply through pipelines is limited, and some of the water available in some areas is contaminated.

Summary of the current response

Overview of Operating National Society Response Action

The Tunisian Red Crescent (TRC) deployed National Disaster Response Team (NDRT), and the local Disaster Response Team (LDRT) to conduct an initial rapid needs assessment. In all the affected governorates, TRC's local branches are coordinating the overall response with affected communities' leaders and the local authorities to collect more information on the situation and identify additional relief needs.

Since the onset of the disaster, the TRC has immediately deployed 100 volunteers in eight governorates equipped with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) from various backgrounds to provide first aid, Psychological Support (PSS). Furthermore, as an immediate response in times of distress, TRC ensured the distribution of household items and food parcels from its warehouse to the affected governorates allocating a total of **200** food baskets (25 unit/location), **280** mattresses (35 unit/location), **450** blankets (50 unit/location) and **400** packs water bottles of six bottles (50 packs /location).

TRC volunteers also intervened to help the Civil Protection units in clearing the flooded area of debris and mud, as well as draining the floodwaters.

Initial rapid assessment was conducted by TRC branches, NDRT, LDRT, and local committee members in flood-affected governorates to determine the immediate needs. In turn, detailed assessments are ongoing in order to specify what are

the specific needs of the affected people.

Overview of Red Cross Red Crescent Movement Actions in country

The IFRC's North Africa Country Cluster Delegation (NA CCD) is working closely with TRC to assess the situation as well as to identify priority needs and capacity gaps which need to be enhanced. Technical and financial support is provided to TRC through IFRC's NA CCD, and the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) Regional Delegation based in Lebanon.

The IFRC MENA Regional Delegation will continue to provide technical inputs in operational planning and

implementation, as well as promote monitoring and evaluation activities. The IFRC, through a DREF operation, will support TRC in their immediate emergency response to the needs of the flood-affected people.

Overview of other actors in country

In response to the disaster, the TRC, in its auxiliary role to public authorities is in collaboration with the National Civil Protection to extract water from houses of the affected communities. In addition, the local authorities dispatched police forces, army, and rescue teams to assist those in need. Besides, the municipalities assisted the affected people by providing some basic needs. Other local organizations, in coordination with TRC, are collecting in-kind donations to be distributed to the affected people. TRC continues to attend regular government-led coordination meetings as needed.

Needs analysis, targeting, and risk assessment

Detailed needs assessment:

The National Disaster Response Team of the Tunisian Red Crescent was immediately dispatched to assess the situation and conduct the needs analysis. Based on information gathered through the initial needs assessment, the identified needs are related to food, household items, shelter, safe drinking water, health, sanitation and hygiene (WASH).

The proposed activities in this operation are designed to complement the ongoing response activities to cover the existing gaps in emergency shelter/ household items (HHIs), health education, and environmental sanitation in the most-affected areas of the eight-targeted states.

Shelter and household items

Due to the floods, homes, household items and assets were all damaged. The initial needs assessment by TRC identified the need to provide affected households with emergency shelter support/assistance as most of them had lost their household items. All affected houses will need to be cleaned and sanitized to be habitable again.

Due to many belongings being lost or damaged beyond repair, there is also a need for mattresses, blankets, clothes, food stocks, hygiene materials, and other items to be identified through detailed assessments. The provision of shelter and household items will ensure that affected are protected from cold weather and damp conditions, specifically respiratory illnesses, water-borne diseases, and that they can maintain their privacy and dignity.

Water, Hygiene and Sanitation (WASH)

Due to flooding, access to drinking water is a major concern. The safe water supply through pipelines has been contaminated, and affected families are also exposed to health risks due to contaminated water wells and surrounding areas.

TRC ensures health and hygiene promotion, such as water-borne diseases caused by polluted water (diarrhea), acute respiratory infections through individual household visits to the most affected people. With stagnant water covering wide areas and inadequate waste disposal, assistance with water and sanitation is therefore essential; Therefore, TRC will consider implementing vector control actions such as clean-up campaigns and spraying, to be carried out with the supervision and support of municipalities and civil defence for drainages.

Targeting:

This DREF operation will target **400 affected families (2,000 people)** in eight governorates (Siliana, Kairouan, Gafsa, Sidi Bouzid, Jendouba, Beja, el Kef, Kasserine), as per the coordination agreement with the local authorities and other internal actors. The response will focus on targeting the urgent needs of the affected communities. In addition, TRCS will continue to conduct a detailed needs assessment over the coming weeks to identify further needs of the affected communities and to ensure that the essential needs of the affected communities are targeted. Targeting will be based on the most vulnerable people who have no income, people with specific needs and will focus on identifying the most vulnerable people among:

- Women;
- Children;
- Elderly people;
- Farmers

Affected people living in low-lying areas and in valleys and villages will be prioritized for the response, as they are most vulnerable. The following table shows the number of affected people and families to be assisted in the eight affected governorates:

To ensure that the community is engaged in the design of activities based on their perspectives, priorities, and needs, and to fulfil their mandate, TRC will be providing support to the most vulnerable where specific needs are identified in line with the findings of their assessments. This DREF is launched based on preliminary information collected by TRC

branches, and it may be revised in the coming weeks once detailed needs assessments are completed and results are shared.

Operation Risk Assessment:

Access to communities

If heavy rainfall occurs again in the area, distributions may be delayed as roads may become impassable, more people will be affected, the impact would be greater, and more health concerns will be raised.

TRC will closely monitor the situation through its network of local branches and volunteers across the country and will scale up this DREF operation whenever deemed necessary.

According to the lessons learned in the 2020 floods, the IFRC MENA Regional Delegation and the NA CCD are working closely with the National Society to facilitate the procurement process and provide the necessary support to the National Society.

COVID-19 Pandemic

The current DREF operation and its operational strategy consider the risks related to the current COVID-19 pandemic and are aligned with the IFRC global emergency appeal that supports National Societies to deliver assistance and support to communities affected or at risk of being affected by the COVID-19 outbreak.

In light of COVID-19, the TRC will continue to apply operational safety and security measures throughout the operation to ensure maintaining access to the affected population, while ensuring the safety of its staff and volunteers.

This DREF operation is aligned with and will contribute to the current [global strategy](#) and [Regional Emergency Plan of Action for COVID-19](#) developed by the IFRC MENA Regional Delegation, in coordination with global and regional partners.

The IFRC continues to assess how emergency operations in response to disasters and crises should adapt to this crisis and provide necessary guidance to its membership on the subject. The National Society will continue to closely monitor the situation and revise accordingly if needed, taking into consideration the evolving COVID-19 situation and potential operational risks, such as operational challenges related to access to the affected population, availability of relief items and procurement issues, and movement of National Society volunteers and staff as well as international staff.

B. Operational strategy

Overall Operational objective:

The overall objective of this operation is to meet the most urgent needs of 400 households (2,000 people) affected by the floods in eight governorates for four months through food baskets and household items (HHIs), hygiene kits, and baby parcels.

The proposed strategy is formulated based on the initial and short-term needs assessment of the affected people. This operation will be supported closely by the IFRC Cluster delegation to ensure the procurement procedures are followed and to support TRC in finalizing the procurement of the mentioned items within the operation timeframe, taking into account that TRC gained experience following the IFRC procurement procedures during the previous DREF operation.

Proposed Strategy

This operation will include the provision of HHIs, hygiene kits, baby parcels, food parcels, health assistance and water to the affected population. Besides, TRC is mobilizing its volunteers to provide psychosocial support to 400 affected households during the distribution of items, as well as to provide the target population with the hygiene key messages with the distribution of the hygiene kits.

The following activities will be supported by this operation:

1. Household Items: (Target: 2,000 people or 400 HHs)

The DREF operation will ensure the provision of household items for 400 HHs/2,000 people who have lost or had their household items damaged due to the floods. Mattresses, beds and blankets will be provided to each household in the eight governorates. The number of mattresses and blankets distributed will be determined by the number of family members, with an average of two mattresses and blankets distributed per family. The beds will be distributed and prioritized to the elderly and people with special needs.

2. Food Security: (Target: 2,000 people or 400 HHs)

Food parcels containing essential food items in Tunisian culture will be procured and distributed to 400 HHs. Each food parcel will include: 5 kgs of pasta, 4 kgs concentrated tomato, 5 kgs rice, 5 kgs couscous, 2 kgs of sugar, 2 kgs salt, 2 cans of jam (470gr/1unit), 3 cans of chamia/Halwa (200 gr/1unit), 2 cans of tuna (400 gr/1unit), 4 packets of coffee (250 gr/1unit) and 5 litres oil.

3. Health and care: (Target: 2,000 people or 400 HHs)

TRC volunteers provided Psychosocial First Aid (PFA) as part of their response and will continue to do so for the affected people. TRC volunteers who are deployed since the onset of the disaster (100 volunteers) will be trained on Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS). TRC Community Based Health and First Aid (CBHFA) teams will carry on health awareness sessions on the various potential health risks, such as water-borne diseases due to polluted water (diarrhoea), acute respiratory infections (including COVID-19 prevention and vaccination).

4. Water, Hygiene and Sanitation: (Target: 2,000 people or 400 HHs)

Hygiene kits will be procured and distributed to 400 HHs. The kit will include 5 toothbrushes, 2 toothpaste, 2 shampoos, 2 shower gel, 2 liquid soap, 5 kg washing powder, dishwashing sponge (5 pc). This kit will ensure to cover the urgent need of the affected families for one month. Therefore, TRC will also proceed to support 100 households who have babies and children (aged between 1 and 3 years) with the provision of baby parcels. The kit will include 3 baby diapers large size (50 pcs), 3 baby wipes, 3 shampoos, and 3 baby soap bars. The kit will be distributed in addition to the hygiene kit in a separate package for two months.

TRC will also ensure that affected people have access to safe drinking water, which will be procured and distributed to 400 HHs. Each household will receive two six-packs of water bottles. These will cover the needs of the affected families for one week as an emergency response. TRC will also organize clean-up/environmental sanitation campaigns for a clean and safe environment for the flood-affected people at several stages throughout the operation.

Operational Support Services

Human Resources

TRC deploys volunteers by sector; 100 volunteers will be mobilized to carry out this emergency operation in the eight target governorates. If additional support is required, volunteer mobilization will be requested from each local community.

To support the TRC in implementing this DREF operation, the IFRC will deploy multiple profiles through Rapid Response System. This system is a mechanism for National Societies to provide and receive peer support through the exchange of response experts for emergency operations. This DREF operation includes a budget for an Operations Manager, a Finance Officer, and a Logistic and Procurement Officer as extra resources for the North Africa Cluster for the implementation of the DREF EPoA. TRC, on the other hand, has dedicated a Programme Coordinator, Logistics Officer, PMER Officer, and Finance Officer at the HQ level to oversee the implementation with the branches, and will also be supported with extra capacities (mainly in the field of Finance, Logistic, PMER and Communication) for the implementation of the activities. The IFRC MENA Regional Delegation will coordinate with the TRC to ensure the quality of implementation by providing technical support to improve the TRC's plan as well as to provide technical guidance and assistance if needed.

Logistics and procurement

The HHIs required for the operation will be procured through TRC local procurement channels to ensure a timely response to the affected population. There will be no international procurement. IFRC Rapid Response Logistic and Procurement Officer and the Regional Global Humanitarian Service & Supply Chain Management unit support will be provided throughout the operation phase to finalize the procurement.

Communications

Constant contact with the TRC volunteers and branches as well as effective communication between all levels of the operation will be maintained throughout the operation. Meetings will be held on a regular basis to provide updates and information on progress.

Publications will be shared on a variety of platforms, including Facebook and Twitter, both locally and internationally. Information, including articles and photos, will be continuously shared with the IFRC Cluster delegation for further dissemination to partners and donors.

Security

TRC will work closely and coordinate with national authorities at central and governmental levels to ensure access to the intervention areas by the TRC volunteers and staff. TRC will mobilize 100 volunteers and will provide them with PPEs to be able to undertake safely their mission.

Planning, monitoring, evaluation, & reporting (PMER)

TRC will oversee all operational, implementation, monitoring and evaluation, and reporting aspects of the present operation in the affected areas through its country-wide network of branches and volunteers along with Central Committee PMER unit. IFRC, through its Regional Delegation and North Africa Country Cluster Delegation, will provide technical support in programme management to ensure the operational objectives are met. Reporting on the operation will be carried out in accordance with the IFRC DREF minimum reporting standards. Operation Update will be issued in the first month and a final report will be issued within three months from the end of the operation. Regular updates in the form of meetings and follow-ups will be conducted between the Cluster Delegation and the TRC. The Operations Manager will ensure the M&E plan are set by the beginning of the operation and regular visit is conducted to work closely with the branches. A lesson learnt workshop will be conducted to review the implementation and a report will be produced for future learning.

Administration and Finance

TRC administration and finance unit will be closely involved to support the financial management of the operation. The IFRC Regional Delegation will provide support to ensure the quality and adherence of standards and procedures. The RR Finance Officer will support TRC throughout the operation.

Protection Gender and Inclusion (PGI):

Acknowledging that women, girls, men, and boys with diverse ages, disabilities and backgrounds have very different needs, risks, and coping strategies, the operation will pay particular attention to the protection and inclusion of vulnerable groups. Beds will be provided to those with special needs to ensure that they receive the assistance they require.

Community Engagement and Accountability (CEA):

The Community Engagement and Accountability (CEA) function is at the core of the response and should integrate CEA minimum actions that help put communities at the centre of the response, by ensuring communication and participation throughout the program cycle.

To inform its interventions and begin the selection process, the TRC has initiated the rapid needs assessment so that the intervention modality is driven by community perspectives as well as observed needs.

While implementing the DREF operation, TRC will continue to assess the situation with the community to facilitate an appropriate response strategy. Depending on the needs, the strategy may need to be reviewed to ensure the National Society is properly resourced and supported to provide life-saving operational activities. For that, TRC will conduct a detailed needs assessment to identify further needs of the affected communities and ensure targeting the essential needs of the affected communities.

TRC will ensure the continuation of activities and plan for an exit strategy during the implementation of the DREF operation. The IFRC regional CEA unit and in collaboration with the IFRC country delegation will be providing needed technical support throughout this program and beyond which will include training to staff and volunteers such as (Feedback mechanism, Risk Communication skills, Rapid assessment), and strengthening the existing feedback mechanism through a diversity of channels as identified within the detailed needs assessment to ensure diverse community participation, initially a feedback and complaint desk will be put in TRC centres for recipients of different TRC services to provide direct feedback. In addition, satisfaction surveys will be conducted regularly as part of monitoring activities such as Process Monitoring and Post Distribution to capture community feedback around the aid provided and design responses accordingly. The IFRC will also provide technical support and guidance in conducting after-action reviews including staff, volunteers, and community members, where results will be utilized to inform future projects. The IFRC will keep on supporting TRC with risk communication technical support related to COVID-19 messaging throughout this DREF.

TRC CBHFA teams will carry on health awareness sessions on a variety of potential health risks, such as water-borne disease due to polluted water (diarrhoea), allergies linked to the drying floods, and acute respiratory infections such as COVID-19.

Population to be assisted: 2,000 people or 400 households in the eight affected governorates: Siliana, Kairouan, Gafsa, Sidi Bouzid, Jendouba, Beja, el Kef, Kasserine will receive psychosocial support.

Needs analysis: As a result of the disaster's effects on water, there is an urgent need to enhance these families' water storage capacity at the household level, as well as to promote health and hygiene. Additional protection and hygiene items are also likely to be required to protect affected communities from the current pandemic. Therefore, some vulnerable families need the procurement of baby parcels as they lost their baby essentials due to the flood.

Population to be assisted: 2,000 people or 400 households in the 8 governorates. Hygiene kits will be distributed to affected households along with household items (HHIs) to ensure that their hygiene needs are met in addition to the provision of safe drinking water. Furthermore, the most vulnerable households (100 HHs) who have babies or children (1 to 3 years) will be provided with baby parcels.

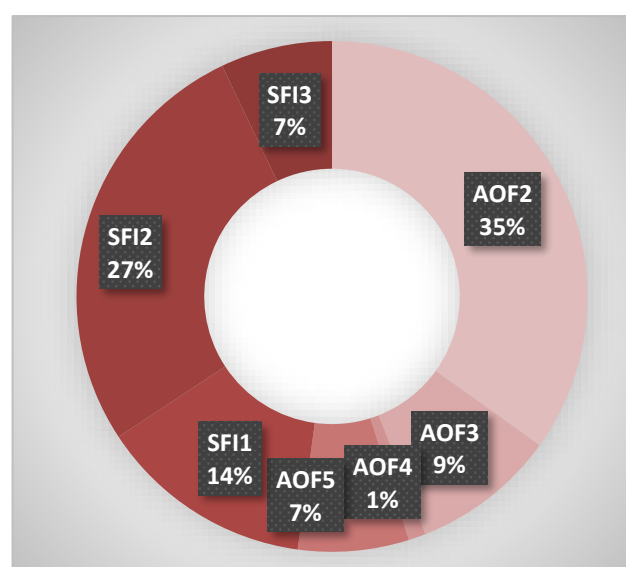

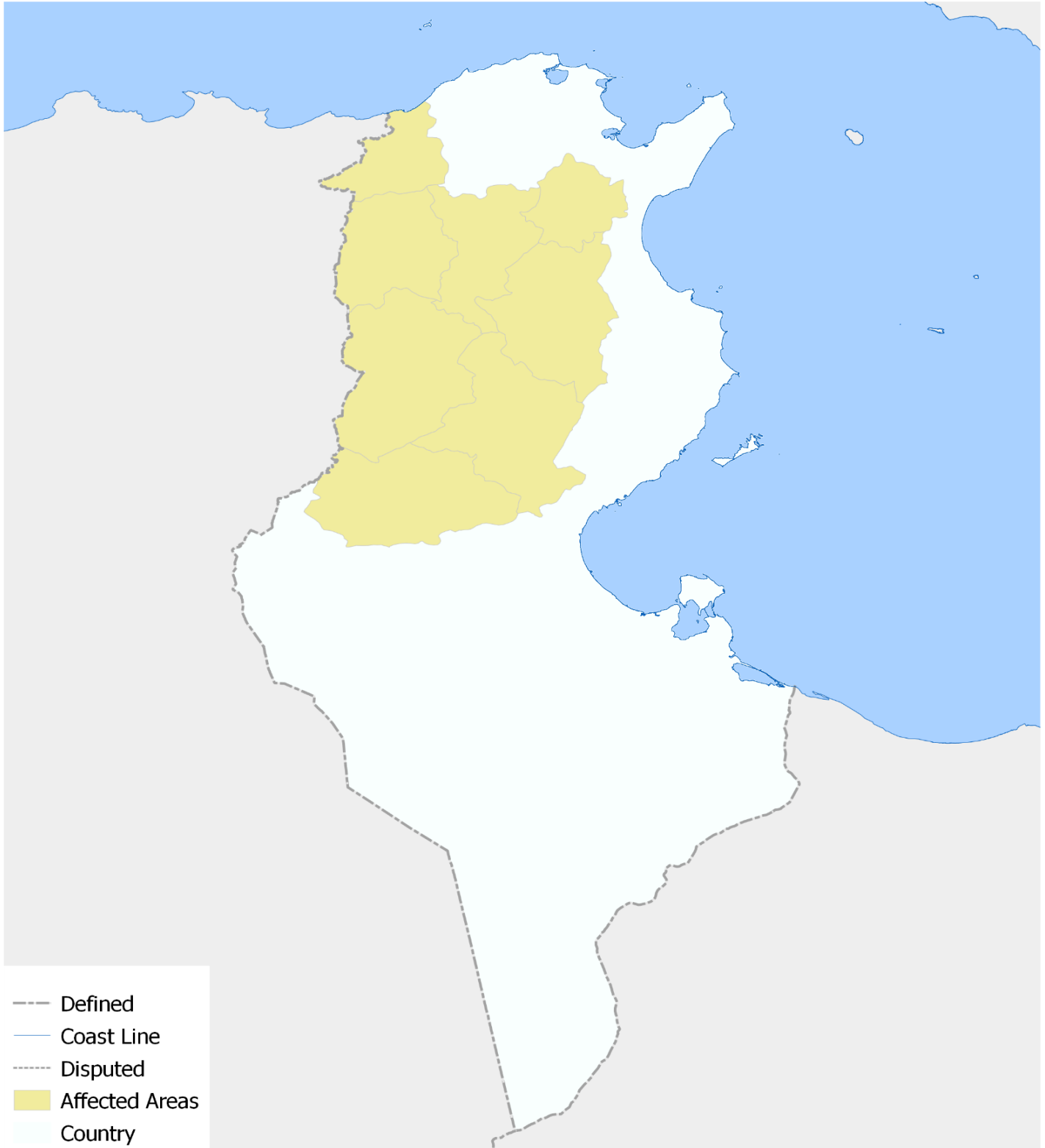




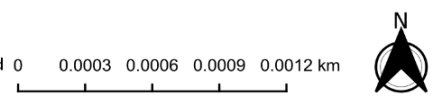
