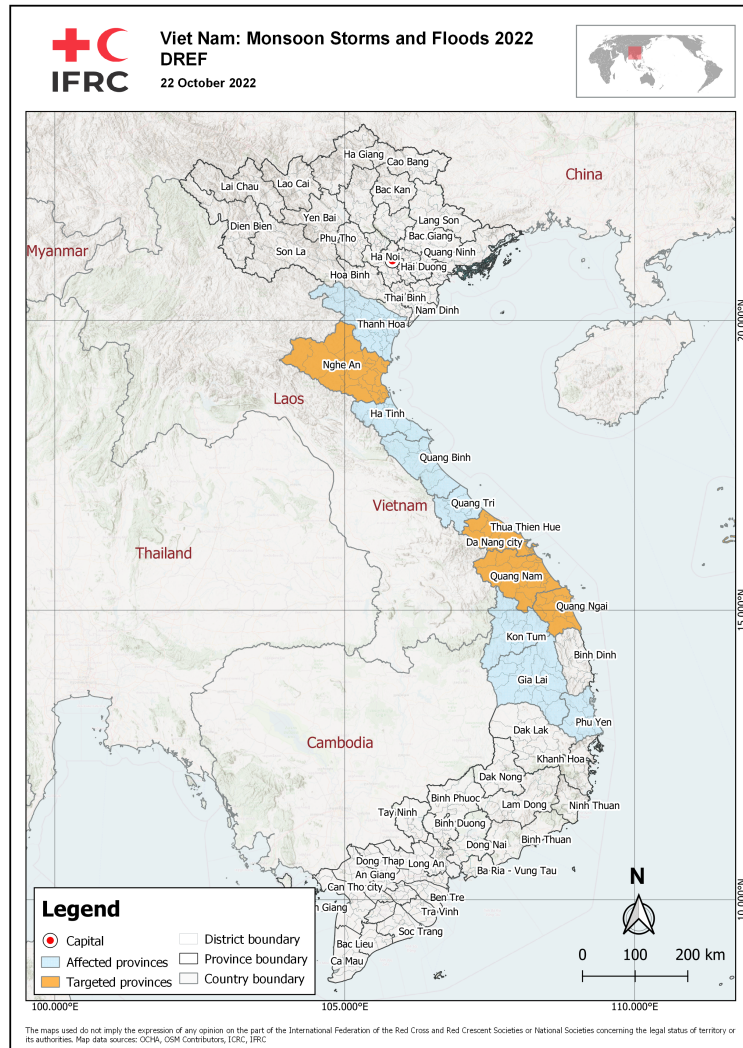

Description of the Event

What happened, where and when?

Vietnam Disaster Management Authority announced a warning on 23 September 2022 that tropical storm NORU would make landfall over middle Vietnam and moved towards Laos and Thailand. The typhoon hit Vietnam on 28th September and weakened to a tropical storm, while bringing severe rainfall successively to the region. During 19:00 on 27 September to 07:00 on 28 September, the Central and Central Highlands regions had heavy to severe rain at 200-300mm in some places. For example, Hue had 117-358mm, Da Nang had 102-233mm, Quang Nam had 112-583mm, Quang Ngai had 139-306mm and Kon Tum had 127-233mm of rainfall. The event resulted in death of 2 people, injury to 62 people, collapse of 160 houses, damages to 3,364 houses and 7,346 houses became flooded across 12 provinces. Additionally, 874 ha of rice, 4,445 ha of crops, 3,0440 ha of aquatic product were flooded, 5,372 trees were fallen, 724 cattle, 20,292 poultry died and washed away.

Rainfall continued to the midland, delta and coastal areas of the North and North Central region from end of September onward in the Central region and the North of the South-Central regions.

On October 14, the tropical depression that formed in the North of Philippines strengthened into storm SONCA and entered the East Sea of Vietnam. The impact of the storm caused a sudden increase in the number of people affected as an additional 21,537 households were affected between 13-15 October. At the same time, the level of rainfall also reached the threshold of the Viet Nam Red Cross' Early Action Protocol for Floods. This is considered the trigger of the event and need for international assistance.

At dawn on October 15, the storm made landfall in Da Nang - Quang Nam with the wind measured at level 3-4, continued going inland and weakened into a low-pressure area and gradually dissipated. The storm created serious flood in Hue and Da Nang city, which reached 0.5-1.5m depth.

After successively storm surges since the end of September up to 18 October, there were 109,217 households (436,868 people) affected with 19 deaths, and 110 injuries, 89,451 inundated houses, 185 collapsed houses, 7,174 damaged houses. The impact of storm and flood is considered one of the worst since 2007.

Scope and Scale

According to a report from the Vietnam Disaster Management Authority on 18 October 2022, flooding has affected 109,217 families or 436,868 people since 28 September in 13 provinces, resulting in 19 fatalities and 110 injuries, inundating 89,451 houses, and causing 185 collapsed houses, and damage to 7,174 houses. Additionally, 874 ha of rice, 4,445 ha of crops, 3,0440 ha of aquatic product were flooded, 5,372 trees were fallen, 724 cattle, 20,292 poultry died and washed away.

The event brought wide-spread impact to the livelihood of people, as shelter was damaged, household items lost, livelihood means seriously affected. People living in the low-lying rural areas and with lower household income are the most affected, as their house structures are more prone to impact of storms and rainfall. People relying on agriculture and aquaculture were most affected in terms of livelihood means.

Specify how the lessons learnt from these previous operations are being used to mitigate similar challenges in the current operation

The DREF operation in 2020 encountered several difficulties, especially in the paperwork for the approval process and coordination among IFRC, FSP, VNRC technical departments, and the local RC Chapters. Close coordination between the VNRC and its partner should be encouraged for a timely response. Strengthening the role of local authorities in beneficiaries' selection and community engagement will increase the efficiency of the interventions. It was advised that close coordination among NS and other governmental bodies in the country needs to be utilized to facilitate the approval process and shorten the waiting time in order to support the arrival of the assistances to the people's hands.

In this operation, actions will be taken early to ensure efficient coordination among the partners and stakeholders. In particular, communication on beneficiary selection will start as soon as possible with the local authorities and community.

Current National Society Actions

Activation Of Contingency Plans	VNRC prepares an annual disaster management plan which was released in the pre-disaster meetings in April this year. The plan mentions the level of a response corresponding to the scale of the disaster, resources data, proposed interventions, and responsibilities of each technical department as well as each local RC Chapter. In late September, before the storm hit the mainland, VNRC HQ triggered the contingency plan and had been providing instructions to the local RC Chapters to activate early action protocols such as providing polyethylene sheet/ bags for people to cover their belongings, providing cash for vulnerable people who are at risk of being affected by the disaster for them to buy materials for shelter strengthening, and assist affected people in evacuation process.
National Society EOC	VNRC has a Disaster Operation Center at its headquarters to command operations, communicate with and supervise its chapters, and to coordinate with various departments related to disaster management in the time of disasters. Since 27 of September 2022 when storms and tropical depressions happens successively, VNRC sets up their regular meetings with related officials and its staff for preparedness and response every week. The VNRC's National Disaster Response Team (NDRT) on receiving steering dispatches from the Government regarding disaster preparedness and response.
Shelter, Housing And Settlements	Before the storm makes landfall, VNRC provided polyethylene sheet/ bags to 1,000 households at risk to cover their belongings, participated with local people to help vulnerable people to strengthen their shelter such as putting sand bags for stabilizing the roof, and distributed CHF 40,160 (VND 1 billion) multi-purpose cash to vulnerable households, selected according to a list provided by the local authorities which includes low-income households, people with disability and other disadvantages. Cash was distributed before the storm allowing the beneficiaries to buy materials for shelter strengthening and other early actions. To date, the VNRC had used up 1,300 relief kits to households who had their shelter damaged due to the impacts of the disasters.
Livelihoods And Basic Needs	VNRC has distributed 1,300 relief kits containing food and non-food items to people affected immediately after the disasters since 29 September for the continuous flooding events. Until the time of DREF application, the total cash that Vietnam Red Cross HQ provided for the affected people was approxi-

	<p>mately CHF 40,160 (VND 1 billion) excluding the support from local Red Cross Chapter.</p>
Water, Sanitation And Hygiene	<p>VNRC has distributed 1000 water purification tablets in Nghe An province. Da Nang RC Chapter provided 5000 fresh water bottles for the people immediately after the flood on 14 Oct. Further interventions regarding hygiene promotion will be carried out once VNRC got support from international assistance.</p>
Protection, Gender And Inclusion	<p>Assistance has reached affected people, which include vulnerable groups such as the elderly, the bed-ridden people, persons with disabilities, children and the homeless.</p>
Multi-purpose Cash	<p>VNRC has already distributed CHF 40,160 (VND 1 billion) as multi-purposed cash to assist people affected by the successive storms from 28 September 2022 until 18 October 2022 from Nghe An province to Phu Yen province. Beneficiaries included vulnerable households selected according to a list provided by the local authorities which includes low-income households, people with disability and other disadvantages.</p>
National Society Readiness	<p>Since the end of September, VNRC Headquarters has had regular meetings with all its chapters to discuss preparedness and plan for situation management in advance for timely and effective assistance. Based on the annual disaster management plan, the VNRC Headquarters coordinated among concerned units such as the National Steering Committee for Disaster Prevention and Control (NDPC), the local government agencies, and local disaster response task forces.</p> <p>Through the National Society's participation in the National Steering Committee on Natural Disaster Prevention and Control, the VNRC maintains constant communication with its colleagues in government. Every VNRC chapter in potentially affected areas is asked to coordinate closely with the local Natural Disaster Prevention and Control Steering Committee. The VNRC has been engaged in supporting the distribution of early warnings and evacuations at the branch level. The VNRC promptly provided emergency aid, including financial aid, and necessities like household kits and boxes of water purification sachets.</p> <p>VNRC has deployed their national disaster response team (NDRT) to respond to the disasters in any preparedness and readiness duties. The VNRC also made sure that the essential resources, such as a warehouse, medical supplies and equipment, relief kits, hygiene kits, household medicine, mobile kitchen operations, trucks, and communication equipment, were available whenever a disaster struck.</p>
Assessment	<p>Provincial Disaster Response Teams (PDRTs) have been deployed to the affected areas in Nghe An, Quang Ngai, Da Nang, Thua Thien Hue and Quang Nam immediately after landfall of SONCA together with Community Disaster Response Teams (CDRTs) to assist the local branches to immediately responding to the floods and conduct the needs assessment.</p>
Coordination	<p>Since late September 2022, VNRC Headquarters and all chapters had a discussion on readiness and plans for response. The VNRC cooperated with local disaster task groups, provincial authorities, Red Cross chapters, and disaster management partnerships on disaster response.</p>

Resource Mobilization	VNRC has mobilized its internal fund to immediately respond to the floods since September with the distribution of relief kits and cash, and assistance in WASH. For example, after the impact of SONCA on 14 Oct, the VNRC supported the people of Da Nang with 300 boxes of household goods with a total value of CHF 7,308 (VND 180 million), and CHF 12,200 (VND 300 million) in cash. The Vietnam Red Cross Society has mobilized private sectors to join with VNRC NHQs and local Red Cross Chapters in providing food, non-food items, and WASH services. The digital funding raising system (Iraiser and fundraising App via MBBank) was activated on October 15.
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Movement Partners Actions Related To The Current Event

IFRC	The IFRC Field Program Officer in Vietnam and the IFRC CCD in Bangkok have constantly monitored the monsoon and storm scenario in relation to the current flooding, and have been in constant contact with the VNRC. The Field Program Officer has worked closely with the provincial Red Cross Chapters to record data on damages and needs for any intervention needed.
ICRC	ICRC supported CHF 3,660 (VND 90 million) to the affected people in Nghe An province. Coverage of this assistance will be taken into consideration when beneficiary are selected for this DREF operation.
Participating National Societies	American Red Cross in Vietnam committed to support USD 49,000 to the affected people in Hue province. Coverage of this assistance will be taken into consideration when beneficiary are selected for this DREF operation.

National authorities	<p>While the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development was responsible for disaster forecast such as water level at reservoirs, the Ministry of Defense leads government response actions, such as evacuation, search and rescue, and relief assistance.</p> <p>Local departments of planning and investment, agriculture and rural development, and border guards alongside with the people's committee were responsible for relief assistance at the community level. Water pumps were set up and other equipment to speed up the flow of water into residential areas, reinforced flood walls with additional sandbags, evacuated residents to makeshift shelters, and given food and non-food supplies to those in need.</p> <p>The National Steering Committee for Disaster Prevention and Control also issued documents to instruct disaster response actions.</p> <p>There is no centralized or comprehensive plan from government to distribute</p>

Needs (Gaps) Identified



Water, Sanitation And Hygiene

While water supply is basically managed by the government, there are needs in hygiene promotion to prevent water borne disease or illness caused by deteriorated hygiene. Hygiene items are also needed but the specific needs are quite diversified, which may be better addressed by cash assistance than hygiene kits distribution.



Shelter Housing And Settlements

Out of the 89,451 houses that were inundated, over 185 houses were destroyed and damaged to various extents, from totally collapsed, to partial damage (cracks, damage to walls, windows, foundation, and structure). The number is expected to be higher as the flood situation continues after 18 Oct when the figures was provided. Based on the initial data collected, the main impacts of the disaster have been to shelter, household items and livelihoods. Roads were submerged, significantly disrupting transportation. Agricultural land has also been flooded. Assistance on shelter repair is required.



Livelihoods And Basic Needs

According to reports from the impacted areas, it is estimated that 2,737 hectares of paddy rice and 10,666-hectares of cash crop; 5,563 hectares of aquaculture; 5,065 cattle and poultry; 1,857 hectares of perennial trees and fruit trees are already lost and damaged. Food and household goods are the immediate needs of the affected communities. Due to the ongoing rain, it is anticipated that the number of individuals in need will increase. Support to restore livelihood means and meet immediate household needs are needed.



Protection, Gender And Inclusion

For the affected population, segregated information is not readily available (e.g., gender, impairments, bedridden, etc.). It is necessary to provide volunteers, staff, and Red Cross personnel with training and orientation. Support is also required to integrate PGI components into the operating sectors.



Health

Health issues like communicable and vector-borne infections are made more likely by ongoing severe rain and flooding. Though there is no widely reported incidents of water-borne disease, the risks are high in provinces which were repeatedly affected by storms and floods since September. In order to lower the risk of illnesses and improve living circumstances, it is vital to encourage health education among the populace in the impacted areas. As some areas were continuously affected by flood since the monsoon season, hygiene situation worth attention.

While MHPSS needs would be common after disaster, the VNRC does not possess sufficient capacity to conduct assessment or plan for intervention. In a separate initiative, support will be provided to VNRC to build up its capacity in the area.

Operational Strategy

Overall objective of the operation

This DREF aims at providing assistance to affected communities by ongoing storms and floods since September, focusing on shelter and livelihood through cash distribution, and health and hygiene promotion. At least 5 worst hit provinces out of the 12 affected provinces will be targeted, namely, Quang Ngai, Da Nang, Quang Nam, Hue, Nghe An.

200 vulnerable affected households (800 people) will benefit from conditional cash for shelter repair. Selected households will receive cash assistance based on the condition that safety standards are met in repair work.

To assist affected households to meet their multiple needs after the storm and flood, the VNRC aims to provide CHF 296,000 (VND 7,400,000,000) as multi-purpose cash to 3,200 households (12,800 people) in need of livelihood assistance. Amount of cash assistance will be categorized into 3 levels: households with 1 member, households with 2 members, and households with 3 members or more, which is in compliance with the CVA procedure endorsed by the VNRC.

Hygiene and health promotion will be conducted to reduce health risks. Hygiene and health messages will be disseminated through IEC material and communication events.

Operation strategy rationale

The VNRC, in collaboration with local governments, played a significant role responding to immediate needs in disaster by providing emergency assistance in food and non-food items to people affected by storms and floods. The successive storms and rainfall have caused damages to shelter and diverse needs in livelihood. This requires a more focus and flexible approach in intervention.

With this DREF operation, the VNRC will provide assistance to the most vulnerable groups to address needs for safe shelter and multiple and diverse humanitarian needs. Relying on its experiences in cash intervention, the VNRC will focus on conditional cash assistance for build-back-safer shelter and multi-purpose unconditional cash assistance, alongside hygiene and health promotion. The level of assistance was agreed at a cash cluster platform and used in previous cash distribution. Technical guidance on build-back-safer will be provided through distribution of leaflets and communication events / community activities, and home visits will be conducted to provide technical support to households with additional needs, e.g. people with disability or elderly households.

Having a collaboration framework with Vietnam Post, a financial service provider which has a nationwide network in all provinces down to the local level, the VNRC will continue to disburse funds utilizing their current logistic system. Upon request and direction from VNRC, VN Post will distribute cash in the targeted communities. 3,200 households (12,800 people) will receive cash assistance from the DREF allocation to meet multi purpose needs, while 200 households (800 people) will receive cash assistance to repair their shelters. Distribution of conditional cash together with technical guidance to 200 household for build-back-safer will be completed within 4 months. Distribution of unconditional multi-purpose case will also be completed within 4 months considering the wide geographical coverage of the assistance.

Hygiene and health promotion will be conducted through distribution of IEC material and promotion events, targeting a larger population affected by storms and floods. Besides the 3,400 vulnerable households (13,600 people) receiving cash assistance, hygiene and health promotion will be extended to the whole community to reach an estimated total of 50,000 people.

Conditional and unconditional cash assistance will complement government intervention as the government does not provide cash assistance to the vulnerable people in response to the storms and floods. Hygiene and health promotion also build on the strength of the VNRC in community engagement and volunteer mobilization.

The IFRC will be enlisted to provide technical assistance in CEA and PGI related activities of the operation.

Targeting Strategy

Who will be targeted through this operation?

For the conditional cash and unconditional multi-purpose cash, the VNRC will target the most vulnerable households that have been severely affected by the storms and floods. At least 5 worst hit provinces out of the 12 affected provinces will be targeted by this DREF operation, namely, Quang Ngai, Da Nang, Quang Nam, Hue, Nghe An.

The VNRC chooses the target beneficiaries utilizing the participatory community approach as soon as the affected individuals initiate the request. The village heads, health personnel, or VNRC volunteers and local authorities will be engaged in the selection process to ensure beneficiaries are selected in accordance with criteria disseminated among the communities.

Explain the selection criteria for the targeted population

Households with houses damaged will be targeted for conditional cash for shelter repair, and households with livelihood means destroyed will be targeted for unconditional multi-purpose cash. The VNRC has endorsed criteria for selection which includes compulsory criteria (families with casualty / families with damages in shelters / livelihood) and priority criteria (low income / household receiving no or little support / household without labour force / household with people with disability or serious diseases / women headed households / households having pregnant women or children under 5 or elderly over 65).

Households can apply for only one of the cash assistance. A leaflet with the information regarding the criteria for selection will be hanged in the commune centre to ensure the transparency. Beneficiary lists will be voted by the village people in the village meetings and validated by the head of villages/ communes. It is expected a roughly equal number of men and women are expected to be covered, and the majority of the households receiving support are from rural areas.

Risk	Mitigation action
Reputational harm that VNRC may experience as a result of false information on cash intervention.	VNRC should work more closely with communities when planning its activities, keep an eye on how the community's perspective about its operations and take appropriate action if necessary, and continue to keep a close eye out for any behavior, including communication, that would violate operational policy, ensure that all volun-

The commitment of people under conditional cash assistance to repair the shelter according to safety standards.

Clear communication with the beneficiary in the village meetings for beneficiary selection and provide technical guidance on build-back-safer in compliance with the local context.

More weather disturbances will impact the same geographical areas causing increased flooding and landslides.

Constant weather system monitoring and emergency planning with VNRC Chapters in the affected areas, so that actions can be taken as soon as possible to limit the impact of potential flood conditions.

Adequate measures will be taken to ensure the safety and security of all personnel involved in this operation.
