Overview

During 2014 the Federation has continued to focus its support to PRCS on better Disaster Preparedness, Organizational Development, Community Based Disaster Risk Reduction and the facilitation of the coordination of cooperation, the development of Humanitarian Diplomacy capabilities and technical assistance in specific areas.

The West Bank and Gaza strip crises dominated most of 2014. Despite immediate response provided by various humanitarian actors including PRCS, there remained a huge challenge in reaching out to the most vulnerable due to the following reasons:

On 7 July 2014, a humanitarian emergency was declared in the Gaza Strip, following a severe escalation in hostilities. Hostilities toned down following an open-ended ceasefire which entered into force on 26 August.

After 51 days of military operations, the extreme violence left on the ground a severe humanitarian situation; 2,256 people were killed during the crisis and 11,295 injured, approximately 70% of them civilians. One third of Gaza population was displaced during the emergency. After the ceasefire still around 70,000 people remained displaced, hosted in UNRWA shelters and schools, government schools and families. 18,000 homes were destroyed and severely damaged and an estimate 100,000 people will not be able to return to their homes in the near future.

Safe and secure transportation inside the Gaza Strip was a constraint limiting the ability of the delivery of urgently required relief supplies. Security of ambulances, staff and volunteers was a huge concern as PRCS ambulances were destroyed and two volunteers were killed in line of duty while several staff and volunteers injured as well.

Displaced families were considered to be particularly vulnerable and in need of NFIs and food items. With limited stock and volunteers facing difficulties accessing some storage warehouses safely in Gaza, the response to the needs in the ground represented a challenge.

The closure of Rafah border (between Egypt and Gaza) and Karm Abu Salem border restricted and delayed the supply of goods NFIs thus making it more difficult to reach out to the affected people in time. The severe winter condition also played a huge role in delaying the inflow of goods to Gaza and West Bank.

From the managerial point of view the Country Representation experienced a vacuum during three quarters (2013-2014) which implied a need to redesign the partnership with the National Society, redefine the role of the Federation and promote resource mobilization initiatives to ensure the presence in country.

Coordinated Activities Agreement has been signed with ICRC. This is an operational agreement that serves to specify the services that ICRC provides to Federation and the responsibilities that Federation acquires in working in oPT under the security umbrella of the ICRC.

A project agreement has been also signed in 2014 with the Italian Red Cross for the provision of local staff under the umbrella of the Federation.

Different Letter of Agreement has been signed with the PRCS for the use of funding and implementation of related activities (DREF Complex Emergency, contribution from OFID through IFRC to PRCS Emergency Appeal, DRR project).

Partnership and cooperation have been crucial topics of discussion between PRCS and its partners and towards the role that IFRC should play in this as well. Thus, during the General Assembly of PRCS in May 2014, a workshop about partnership was organized and this was again central discussion during the partnership meeting for Gaza crises organized in Gaza, in September 2014. Recommendations and outcomes of the meeting have been key elements to design the Development Operational Plan of Federation for 2015.

Comments on progress towards outcomes			
- Support to the Palestine Red Crescent Society on the preparation of the revised emergency appeal for the crisis in Gaza and Opt. After need assessment, PRCS revised its Emergency Appeal. The estimated cost of the response reaches an amount of 63,071,438 USD. - During the period IFRC launched a DREF in July, to support the delivery of critical assistance to the affected population. With a budget of 228.474 CHF the aim is to assist 10,500 people (3.500 patients per month) in order to provide medical assistance for emergency needs and ensure that services in medical facilities are not interrupted. The DREF was foreseen for 3 months and includes the provision of medical supplies and equipment and fuel to PRCS medical facilities in both West Bank and Gaza. Due to the unexpected dimension of the conflict procedures for procurement have been negatively affected in terms of security, access and delays. For this reason a non-cost extension has been approved with deadline 15th of January 2015. - Support to PRCS on the preparedness for response to upcoming foreseen cold wave.

- General Assembly of the PRCS, 2-3 May 2014 where the news strategy of the National Society 2014-2018 has been adopted. Partnership workshop in occasion of General Assembly. - On the 5th of August, Middle East and North Africa National Societies met in Amman, to discuss the current intervention and recommendations to further support the Red Cross Red Crescent's response. Stakeholder participation and feedback (200 words/2 paragraphs)

2014 has been focused on the response to the Gaza crisis and tensions in West Bank. Since the beginning of the crisis, mid-June, the PRCS increased its contact with the Movements partners present in oPT, ICRC, IFRC and partner National Societies and several coordination meetings were organized during the period. The Movement partners with their presence in Palestine and others with no physical presence in addition to non-Movement partners have been pivotal in assisting the National Society to respond to challenges and recurrent emergencies.

For Gaza intervention, ICRC with the PRCS, have been jointly conducting assessments whenever possible. The PRCS mobilized its volunteers, DM, EMS, logistics services, as well as media support to respond to the emergency according to the needs and situation.

During the crises, PRCS organized three coordination meetings with Red Cross Red Crescent (RCRC) partners in Ramallah. Two RCRC Movement conference calls were organized by ICRC. On 5 August, 2014, the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) National Societies met in Amman to discuss interventions and recommendations to further support the RCRC's response. This meeting was jointly organized by PRCS and IFRC-MENA and hosted by Jordan Red Crescent.

On 17 September, 2014, PRCS organized an emergency RCRC Movement meeting on Gaza crises, held in Gaza city, to further discuss strengthened response and explore ways to enhance the support, cooperation and coordination with PRCS.

Mid October, 2014, ARCO (Arab Red Crescent and Red Cross Organization) conducted a technical visit to Gaza in order to support need assessment on current situation of health issues and other humanitarian issues.

PRCS deployed its capacity in the logistics to handle goods, human resources movement, transfer of in-kind donations to Gaza and West Bank, from different routes; from West Bank to Gaza Strip, from Egyptian border to Gaza Strip and from Jordan route to West Bank. This is done in coordination with the ICRC and the Egyptian Red Crescent, for Egyptian border. Hence, PRCS in cooperation with ICRC and IFRC have developed and shared guidelines related to procedures for donations with all RCRC Movement partners who support PRCS to help facilitate a coordinated and needs-driven response, thus ensuring the efficient and effective humanitarian response to the victims.

The ICRC launched a preliminary appeal on 25 July to scale up its response to humanitarian needs arising from the hostilities for an amount of CHF 15,000,000 and activated its rapid mechanism and started to mobilize additional staff to support its emergency response.

In parallel to the revised emergency appeal, IFRC launched a DREF on 15 July, 2014 for CHF 228,474 to provide immediate emergency response and to ensure that people injured by military attacks in Gaza Strip received medical treatment.

During the period, IFRC provided technical support on communication/sharing information through regular updates on the emergency with preparation of different materials -information bulletin, facts and figures, infograph and talking points-.

Coordinating with authorities

Besides the Movement coordination, the PRCS together with ICRC and IFRC is coordinating efforts and sharing operational information with inter-agency partners including OCHA, UNRWA, and others.

The PRCS also held several meetings with World Health Organization (WHO) and MoH to support Gaza and Area C of the West Bank on health, nutrition, PSP support and resilience. The coordination focused on the intervention with mobile clinics and also relief support in order to prevent duplication of efforts and promote division of tasks. Meetings were also held with the Palestine Civil Defence on search and rescue efforts and evacuation of the affected people.

Key Risks or Positive Factors

The nature and scope of humanitarian needs in the occupied Palestinian territory (oPt) have changed little in recent years.

The first six months of 2014 saw the break-down of the US-brokered peace talks, absence of a political resolution to the conflict, continued Israeli occupation, recurring escalations of hostilities as well as the further deterioration of the humanitarian situation in the Gaza Strip, including fuel and energy crisis and unpaid salaries to government employees. These events significantly impacted the agenda in the first half year of 2014.

In particular, the July-August hostilities in Gaza led to unprecedented destruction and displacement in the Gaza Strip, with humanitarian actors struggling to provide assistance and secure humanitarian space throughout the conflict. In addition to the vast ramifications of the Gaza conflict, the second part of 2014 saw a renewed focus on the risk of forcible transfer for Bedouin communities in the central West Bank, intensified access restrictions on Palestinian entry into the al Aqsa mosque compound as well as demolitions, settlement expansion and state land acquisition in the West Bank. The second half of 2014 also witnessed a resumption of the Israeli authorities' policy of punitive demolitions.

The overall socio-economic and political situation in the oPt leaves the Palestinian population highly vulnerable to any kind of natural or manmade hazard, which can easily lead to small and large scale disasters including earthquakes, floods, landslides, droughts and desertification due to climate variability and change. The conflict and the West Bank barrier has been identified as the highest disaster risk, with women, children, elderly and persons living with disabilities regarded the most vulnerable groups particularly in terms of access.

With very little hope of a peace resolution, the Palestinians continue to face challenges economically, socially, psychologically and in regards to health and nutrition.

The Federation Representation in Palestine aims to support PRCS to implement its strategic vision and increase impact at the community level in a challenging and changing environment; to facilitate its cooperation with partners, its positioning in the international community and its contributions to the Federation.

PRCS, one of the main actors in the Palestinian active civil society, is working to meet the needs of the vulnerable Palestinians both in the West Bank, East Jerusalem, Gaza, and for the refugees in Lebanon, Syria and Egypt, maintaining its full independence in a heavily politically-charged environment. Its activities cover disaster preparedness, disaster risk reduction, rehabilitation and ability development, emergency medical services, psycho-social support, primary and secondary health care, dissemination of IHL, with some 5,000 active volunteers and youth members.

Lessons learned and looking ahead (200 words/2 paragraphs)

1. Need to maintain a sustainable dialogue with the National Society based on trust and long-term commitment to its Strategy with a better understanding of its role in the response of the humanitarian needs at country level and IFRC role in better support to PRCS.

2. Importance of the setting up of a frame to include the collective effort of the wide Federation, including partner national Societies in Palestine
3. Crucial aspect of support mechanism for coordination between wide Federation –PRCS/PNS/IFRC secretariat- to better define collective RCRC Movement action with clear roles and areas of intervention

In order to support the Strategic goals of PRCS and its efforts to respond to the most important humanitarian challenges in oPT including the response to the recent conflict in Gaza and increasing tensions in West Bank, the Federation Representation in 2015, in line with Strategy 2020 and Long-Term Planning framework for Palestine will focus on:

- Raise humanitarian standards by supporting PRCS to increase its contribution to the Federation-wide databank and reporting system and other global IFRC studies
- Increase RCRC disaster preparedness in Palestine and further defining RCRC Movement roles and responsibilities in case of conflict and disasters as well as the RCRC Movement's role in inter-agency contingency plan
- Empower Palestinian communities and improve their resilience faced to recurrent disasters and crisis by supporting PRCS to implement Community Based Resilience Programme while reinforcing health and well-being through Community Based Health programmes and Interpersonal violence prevention program
- Enhance PRCS capacities to address contextual gaps and vulnerabilities and enhance organization resilience, challenging the common humanitarian values by supporting PRCS in Youth Action and Volunteering Development in general, volunteer protection and violence prevention programmes
- PRCS Humanitarian Diplomacy capacities improved and advocacy effectively used to promote RCRC image, brand and message by supporting PRCS in developing further their approach to Humanitarian Diplomacy and ensuring the Federation presence in Palestine according to its status as international organisation
- Ensure that overall Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement work in Palestine is more efficient, consistent and coherent by strengthening Movement coordination and supporting activities linked to the monitoring of the MoU between PRCS and MDA

How we work

All IFRC assistance seeks to adhere to the [Code of Conduct for the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement and Non-Governmental Organizations](#) (NGO's) in Disaster Relief and the [Humanitarian Charter and Minimum Standards in Disaster Response \(Sphere\)](#) in delivering assistance to the most vulnerable.

The IFRC's vision is to inspire, encourage, facilitate and promote at all times all forms of humanitarian activities by National Societies, with a view to preventing and alleviating human suffering, and thereby contributing to the maintenance and promotion of human dignity and peace in the world.

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The IFRC's work is guided by Strategy 2020 which puts forward three strategic aims:

1. Save lives, protect livelihoods, and strengthen recovery from disaster and crises.
