OVERALL PROGRESS

Context

Turkmenistan gained independence in 1991 and shares its borders with Iran, Afghanistan, Kazakhstan, and Uzbekistan. It operates as a Presidential Republic with a total area of 491.2 square kilometres, making it the second-largest country in the region after Kazakhstan. According to the ongoing population and housing stock census, as of December 2022, Turkmenistan's population was about six million people.

It is a secular state and was recognized as a permanently neutral state by the United Nations (UN) in 1995. Turkmenistan has diplomatic relations with 151 countries, guarantees religious freedom, and has a separate public education system.

Economically, Turkmenistan is an upper-middle-income country, heavily reliant on gas exports. It has rich natural gas and oil fields, being the world's tenth-largest cotton producer. The economy is heavily dependent on gas exports and has been impacted by events such as the Russia-Ukraine war, leaving more people at risk of poverty.

Access to education is compulsory up to nine years with the government providing free primary and secondary education. Though progress has been made, challenges in education quality and availability remain in remote areas hindering human development and socio-economic progress.

Key achievements

Climate and environment

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan procured and provided water pumps as part of the United States Agency for International Development Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance initiative, ensuring access to clean water for communities in six villages and surrounding areas. The National Society actively contributed to implementing Turkmenistan's National Climate Change Adaptation Plan as a member of the Interagency Commission on Environmental Protection. It engaged the public through extensive information campaigns to raise awareness about climate change and organized events to involve volunteers in educational outreach. Collaborating with UNICEF, the National Society expanded its climate change awareness efforts to schools, utilizing volunteers as peer educators to reach students effectively.

Disasters and crises

For the period January to December 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan strengthened local and national emergency preparedness and response capacities. It procured essential household items and emergency response equipment for three Local Disaster Management Committees and equipped the National Disaster Response Team (NDRT) with specialized clothing. The National Society held an NDRT induction meeting in Ashgabat and refreshed the National Contingency Plan. Crisis centres were established in three provinces and training sessions for school staff on emergency preparedness, first aid, climate change adaptation and psychosocial support were conducted. Additionally, disaster risk reduction initiatives focused on child-centred community-based interventions, including enhanced vulnerability and capacity assessments (eVCA) were implemented. The National Society responded to the October earthquake in Afghanistan and provided humanitarian aid to affected families. Youth volunteers were engaged in disaster preparedness and safety initiatives, and a community-based disaster risk reduction training was organized for volunteers and staff. The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan enhanced its preparedness for cash-based interventions by consulting with state authorities and hiring a national consultant to explore the legal framework for cash and voucher assistance (CVA).

Health and wellbeing

During the reporting period, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan collaborated with the United Nations Development Programme and the World Health Organization on a Global Fund-supported project targeting epidemic and pandemic preparedness and mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) through extensive training initiatives. It organized educational programmes and first aid training sessions in partnership with government agencies. The National Society advanced its tuberculosis prevention project by piloting a video-observed treatment system and launched an information campaign to raise awareness about tuberculosis prevention. It conducted a Tobacco Control Day campaign under the Saglyk (health) state programme, promoting healthy lifestyles and infectious

disease prevention. It also participated in a round table on gender equality in public health and a seminar on tuberculosis screening and prevention. Additionally, the National Society developed a first aid training project, focusing on public health emergency preparedness and raising awareness of non-communicable diseases through volunteer efforts. It also organized an emergency response exercise for international organizations and corporate sector staff in Turkmenistan to mark World First Aid Day, maintaining collaboration with government agencies to promote first aid knowledge and support vulnerable populations.

Migration and displacement

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan launched the '[Legal Assistance to Undocumented/Stateless Persons in Turkmenistan](#)' project, focusing on data collection, research and information management. The National Society strengthened its capacity to prepare for a potential influx of [refugees from Afghanistan](#), emphasizing humanitarian diplomacy to provide legal support for undocumented individuals. It built effective partnerships to address the needs of vulnerable populations and advocated for non-discriminatory support. Additionally, it made efforts to increase awareness of these critical issues through prominent news programmes and websites.

Values, power and inclusion

During the reporting period, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan promoted [humanitarian education](#) and gender equality through training sessions targeting youth and specifically [engaging young men](#) in discussions about gender equality and the psychosocial development of children during emergencies. The National Society strengthened community engagement and accountability (CEA) by organizing training for school administrators, teachers, staff and volunteers in Lebap, Dashoguz, Ahal and Ashgabat city, conducting briefings on human trafficking and domestic violence, and sharing the CEA Guide and Toolkit in Russian. Additionally, it implemented community-based initiatives led by young volunteers, raised awareness on humanitarian and protection issues and formed a rapid response team trained in community engagement and accountability (CEA), protection, gender and inclusion (PGI) and human trafficking.

Enabling local actors

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan expanded its volunteer base by joining the European-Central Asian Youth Network and implementing the 'Development of Volunteering in Turkmenistan' project, which provided social support such as English classes for vulnerable groups. The National Society advanced its 2021-2025 development strategy through training in branch development, institutional capacity and financial discipline, while updating its [statutes](#) to align with the latest IFRC standards. It prioritized gender equality and [humanitarian education](#), focusing on [psychosocial](#) training. The National Society also made efforts to address domestic violence and human trafficking and submitted a project for a unified local computer network via the [IFRC Capacity Building Fund](#) for 2024. The National Society fulfilled its international human rights obligations by conducting training sessions and enhancing visibility through its website. It engaged in humanitarian diplomacy by sending aid to Türkiye, Syria and Palestine, and participated in Central Asian forums on tuberculosis control and disaster response. The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan maintained a balanced gender ratio, integrating individuals with disabilities and single parents into its workforce and confirmed its financial discipline through an internal audit, while improving staff onboarding with a structured orientation programme.

STRATEGIC PRIORITIES



Climate and environment

Progress by the National Society against objectives

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan procured and provided water pumps to as part of the USAID Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance initiative. Through its efforts, the National Society facilitated access to clean water for people in six villages and surrounding areas. Throughout the year, the National Society also played a critical role in implementing Turkmenistan's [National Climate Change Adaptation Plan](#). As an active member of the Interagency Commission on Environmental Protection, it continuously engaged with the public, running extensive information campaigns at all levels to raise awareness on climate change and adaptation. The National Society also organized an event to involve volunteers in educating the public about climate change. Additionally, in collaboration with UNICEF, the National Society extended its climate change awareness activities to schools, reaching students through volunteers who served as peer educators.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC provided financial support to the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in the installation of water pumps in pilot regions. It also provided technical guidance to the National Society in carrying out a climate change awareness campaign which engaged its volunteers to inform the public.

Progress by the National Society against objectives

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan reinforced both local and national capacities for emergency preparedness and response as part of the ongoing Central Asian programme. The National Society procured essential household items and emergency response equipment for three Local Disaster Management Committees. Members of the National Disaster Response Team (NDRT) were equipped with specialized clothing bearing the National Society logo and banners promoting disaster risk awareness were created for sessions and trainings.

The National Society held an NDRT induction meeting in Ashgabat in August and conducted a workshop to refresh the National Contingency Plan. The heads of provincial branches, in coordination with the central office, converted utility rooms into crisis centres. In three provinces—Dashoguz, Lebap and Akhal—training was conducted for school staff in emergency preparedness, [first aid](#), climate change adaptation and [psychosocial support](#). Emergency preparedness competitions were also held in nine schools. Additionally, fire safety shields were installed in schools to enhance fire preparedness.

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan also implemented [disaster risk reduction](#) initiatives, focusing on enhancing child-centred community-based interventions and school safety measures. In 2023, it conducted enhanced vulnerability and capacity assessments (eVCA) in communities, collaborating with local departments on disaster preparedness. The National Society responded swiftly to the [October earthquake in Afghanistan](#), which affected Turkmenistan's border areas and provided humanitarian aid to families affected by domestic and natural fires. Throughout the year, the National Society actively raised public awareness of disaster risks.

The National Society engaged youth volunteers in disaster preparedness efforts and school safety initiatives, incorporating climate change adaptation awareness. In August 2023, it organized a five-day [community-based disaster](#)

risk reduction training for volunteers and staff, covering psychosocial support, PGI in emergencies and international humanitarian law. Competitions and educational activities in schools emphasized preparedness and safety, while information boards and brochures in the Turkmen language helped spread emergency response rules.

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan enhanced its preparedness for cash-based interventions, including cash and voucher assistance (CVA), by conducting consultations with state authorities and public organizations. A national consultant was hired to explore the legal framework, and a one-day meeting formalized the provision of cash and vouchers as humanitarian aid.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC supported the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in the implementation of its activities as part of Central Asian programme. The IFRC provided financial support to the National Society for the procurement of emergency response equipment and household items for Local Disaster Management Committees. The IFRC also supported the organization of NDRT workshops and the implementation of disaster preparedness initiatives in schools. Additionally, the IFRC also supported the National Society's efforts to introduce cash and voucher assistance.



Health and wellbeing

Progress by the National Society against objectives

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan collaborated with the United Nations Development Programme and the World Health Organization on a Global Fund-supported project, focusing on epidemic and pandemic preparedness and mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) through extensive training initiatives. In collaboration with the government s, the National Society held educational programmes and first aid training sessions.

The National Society advanced its tuberculosis prevention and support project, piloting a video-observed treatment system to improve services for patients. It also worked on a funding request for future tuberculosis programmes based on its strong performance. It also launched an information campaign distributing materials that raised awareness about tuberculosis and its prevention.

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan conducted a Tobacco Control Day information campaign under the Saglyk (health) state programme. The National Society ran campaigns promoting healthy lifestyles and infectious disease prevention and took part in a round table on gender equality in public health organized by UNFPA. The National Society also participated in a WHO-led seminar on systematic tuberculosis screening and prevention. This seminar aimed to improve the delivery of community-based tuberculosis services and was part of ongoing efforts to enhance tuberculosis prevention and treatment.

A first aid training project was also designed by the National Society. Its health initiatives included both commercial and non-commercial first aid training, non-communicable disease awareness and health disaster preparedness. The National Society focused on public health emergency preparedness by conducting training in both urban and rural areas in partnership with the Ministry of Health.

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan worked to raise awareness of non-communicable diseases, provide self-care support to affected individuals and mobilize resources for disease prevention activities. Information campaigns and volunteer activities helped increase community understanding of both communicable and non-communicable diseases.

Additionally, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan organized an emergency response exercise for international organizations and corporate sector staff in Turkmenistan to mark World First Aid Day. It maintained active collaboration with government agencies and partners, promoting first aid knowledge and providing social support to vulnerable populations through trained volunteers.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC supported the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in the implementation of its tuberculosis prevention and control project. It also provided support to the National Society to launch initiatives to support healthy lifestyle

promotion and disease prevention. Additionally, the IFRC provided technical and financial assistance to the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in strengthening first aid knowledge and public health preparedness.



Migration and displacement

Progress by National Society against objectives

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan implemented a project 'Legal Assistance to Undocumented/ Stateless Persons in Turkmenistan'. The project involved data collection, research, analysis and information management initiatives. Although the number of refugees and displaced persons in Turkmenistan is minimal, the National Society enhanced its capacity to prepare for a potential influx of refugees due to its proximity to Afghanistan. Humanitarian Diplomacy activities played a crucial role in the project, focusing on legal assistance for undocumented and stateless persons. The National Society established effective partnerships to address the needs of vulnerable populations. Discussions during the cash and voucher assistance roundtable emphasized the issues faced by migrants, refugees and stateless persons, advocating for non-discriminatory support and legislative backing. These considerations were integrated into social support and disaster preparedness planning. Through the project's media coverage, including prominent news programmes and websites, the National Society also increased awareness and understanding of these critical issues.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC provided technical and financial support to the National Society's to strengthen its capacity for data collection, research and legal assistance initiatives.

Values, power and inclusion

Progress by the National Society against objectives

During the reporting period, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan actively promoted humanitarian education and gender equality across Turkmenistan. In collaboration with UNFPA, the National Society delivered gender education to youth and volunteers, conducting eight training sessions for specific population groups. Efforts targeted engaging young men in gender equality discussions, addressing the risks of gender inequality during emergencies and focusing on the psychosocial development of children and adolescents.

To strengthen community engagement and accountability (CEA), the National Society organized training for school administration, teachers, staff and volunteers in Lebap, Dashoguz, Ahal and Ashgabat city. CEA briefings were also conducted during a national camp for volunteers and staff. It also conducted sessions on human trafficking and domestic violence. Additionally, it shared CEA Guide and Toolkit in Russian.

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan implemented community-based initiatives led by young volunteers, conducting information campaigns and awareness-raising activities on humanitarian and protection issues. Additionally, it formed a rapid response team including volunteers trained in community engagement and accountability (CEA), protection, gender and inclusion (PGI), and human trafficking.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC provided the National Society with materials to strengthen its CEA efforts.

ENABLING LOCAL ACTORS



Strategic and operational coordination

IFRC membership coordination

IFRC membership coordination involves working with member National Societies to assess the humanitarian context, humanitarian situations and needs; agreeing on common priorities; jointly developing common strategies to address issues such as obtaining greater humanitarian access, acceptance and space; mobilizing funding and other resources; clarifying consistent public messaging; and monitoring progress. This also means ensuring that strategies and programmes in support of people in need, incorporate clarity of humanitarian action, links with development assistance, and efforts to reinforce National Societies in their respective countries, including through their auxiliary role.

The **Red Crescent Society of Kyrgyzstan**, along with the **Spanish Red Cross** provides peer-to-peer support to the National Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in volunteer development, youth management and home care

Movement coordination

The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan ensures regular exchanges with the IFRC, the International Committee of the Red Cross and participating National Societies, for the alignment of support and action between Movement partners. In times of emergencies, closer coordination is organized. This is carried out in line with the Strengthening Movement Coordination and Cooperation (SMCC) principles, and the newly-adopted Seville Agreement 2.0.

The **ICRC** supports the National Societies in Central Asia in restoring family links, international humanitarian law, mental health, and psychosocial support, and emergency preparedness response programming. It informs governmental authorities on international humanitarian law and its integration into legislation, academic curricula and the practices of military and security forces.

External coordination

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan strengthened its role as an auxiliary to the government by fostering collaboration at national and international levels. As a member of the State Interagency Commission for Emergencies and Disasters, the National Society focused on informing and preparing the population for potential emergencies, reinforcing its commitment to community resilience. The National Society also participated in the Interdepartmental Commission for ensuring Turkmenistan's adherence to international human rights and International Humanitarian Law obligations, demonstrating its dedication to upholding international standards.

In health-related initiatives, the National Society played a key role in various Interdepartmental Coordinating Committees, contributing to national programmes on malaria prevention, HIV/AIDS and STD prevention, TB control, safe medical waste handling, and safe motherhood. Its engagement in the Turkmenistan Commission for the Prevention of Human Trafficking highlighted its focus on addressing social challenges, while participation in the Interagency Commission on Environmental Protection reflected its commitment to integrating environmental concerns into humanitarian work.

Internationally, the National Society cultivated partnerships with key organizations such as UNICEF, USAID and UNDP/WHO. It also collaborated with IOM, foreign embassies and the EU Delegation, reinforcing its engagement in international humanitarian efforts. Domestic partnerships with the private sector, academic institutions, and NGOs further bolstered its efforts. In resource mobilization, the National Society explored support opportunities, particularly among small and medium-sized businesses engaged in social activities.



National Society development

Progress by the National Society against objectives

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan joined the European-Central Asian Youth Network, expanding its volunteer base. The "Development of Volunteering in Turkmenistan" project provided social support through activities such as English classes for vulnerable groups and master classes for children with disabilities and orphans. The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan actively pursued its 2021-2025 development strategy, conducting training in branch development, institutional capacity and financial discipline for staff and volunteers, while also adapting to administrative changes in Turkmenistan by updating its statutes to with the latest IFRC standards and modifying branches and staffing structures.

The National Society promoted gender equality and humanitarian education, training staff and volunteers on psychosocial aspects of emergencies. The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan worked on proposals for grants to support key issues such as gender equality, domestic violence and human trafficking. It also submitted the IFRC Capacity Building Fund (CBF) project to set up a unified local computer network, which is expected to be implemented in 2024.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC supported the National Society in strengthening its branch development and volunteering. It aided the National Society in submitting the IFRC Capacity Building Fund (CBF) as well as provided technical support in the statutory revision process to ensure that the statutes aligned with the latest IFRC standards.

The Spanish Red Cross provided support to the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in the implementation of its project focused on the development of volunteering in Turkmenistan.



Humanitarian diplomacy

Progress by the National Society against objectives

In 2023, the National Society focused on fulfilling its international obligations in human rights and international humanitarian law. The National Society prioritized disseminating international humanitarian law (IHL), conducting consultations, seminars and training sessions across military and civil institutions. The Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan shared information about its activities on its website to gain visibility, while monitoring compliance with the Red Cross and Red Crescent Symbols Use and Protection Act.

The National Society supported joint advocacy efforts for key policy asks by participating in events. It also engaged in humanitarian diplomacy by sending humanitarian aid to Türkiye, Syria and Palestine for the first time. Additionally, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan engaged in various forums, workshops and networks across Central Asia, focusing on areas such as tuberculosis control, disaster response and volunteerism. National-level efforts included awareness campaigns, alongside collaborations with international organizations and local ministries to promote humanitarian principles and engage with communities.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC provided support to the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan in furthering its advocacy efforts.

The ICRC provided technical and financial support to the National Society in the dissemination of international humanitarian law (IHL).



Accountability and agility (cross-cutting)

Progress by the National Society against objectives

In 2023, the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan prioritized gender considerations within its operations, maintaining a balanced gender ratio. It emphasized inclusiveness by integrating individuals with disabilities, single mothers and older individuals into its workforce and volunteer base. The human resources department actively engaged with these groups to foster morale and ensure their participation in the National Society's activities. The National Society also conducted an internal audit in early 2023 confirming its commitment to financial discipline, revealing no major violations.

Additionally, the National Society improved staff onboarding and development by implementing a comprehensive documentation package including orientation and induction programmes for new employees.

IFRC network joint support

The IFRC provided support to the Red Crescent Society of Turkmenistan by making efforts to improve its financial and procurement capabilities.

DATA SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS

- **Missing data and breakdowns:** National Societies have diverse data collection systems and processes that may not align with the standardized indicators. Data may not be available for some indicators, for some National Societies. This may lead to inconsistencies across different reporting tools as well as potential under or over-estimation of the efforts led by all.
- **Reporting bias:** The data informing this Federation-wide overview is self-reported by each National Society (or its designated support entity) and which is the owner and gatekeeper, and responsible for accuracy and updating. IFRC tries to triangulate the data provided by the National Societies with previous data and other data in the public domain.
